

Term 3 Attendance Report

We've received our Term 3 Attendance Report from the Ministry of Education, and it's a good time to share how attendance is measured across New Zealand:


Regular attendance: over 90% attendance Irregular absence: between 80-90% Moderate absence: between 70-80% Chronic absence: 70% or less

The Government's goal is that by 2030, 80% of students will be attending school more than 90% of the time. Our Term 3 report shows that only 68% of our students are meeting this goal at the moment, although this is much better than Term 3, 2024 it is still well below what we would like and what is expected. If you are unsure of your child's current attendance rate, please give us a call. We include the attendance rate in the mid-year report and end of year report as well.

We know it can sometimes be tricky deciding if your child is well enough for school, or keeping routines on track. If you're unsure, or if getting your child to school has been a bit of a challenge, please have a chat with us – we're here to help and want to work alongside you to support your child.
