2026 Year 11 Course Information

The courses outlined in this document are for our KingsGate School 2026 Year 11 aakonga|students. Whaanau and aakonga|students should not fear making wrong option choices. We serve a big God who can turn all things into good (Romans 8:28). He can open and close doors concerning your future. If He has destined us to do something and we are walking close to Him, then He will make it happen (Revelation 3:7)

As a state-integrated school, KingsGate follows the New Zealand National Curriculum, just like other state schools, but we can incorporate our special character into our teaching. For example, as a non-denominational Christian school, we teach the same core subjects as other state schools and also include religious education, applying a Christian lens across all areas of learning.

Our Christian faith defines our special character, which is protected by law and upheld by our board and proprietor. KingsGate School is a non-denominational, state-integrated school, which means that key core statements of faith are upheld, and all peripheral denominational theology is respected and discussed.

At KingsGate School, there are two New Zealand qualifications that aakonga|student can follow to achieve Level One of the New Zealand Level Qualification Framework (see Appendix 1). They are **NCEA** Level One or **NZCFS** Level One.

The **NATIONAL CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT (NCEA)** is New Zealand's main secondary level qualification. At KingsGate, aakonga|students can study NCEA Level One to develop an understanding of NCEA, refining their study skills and specific subject knowledge to prepare them for Years 12 and 13. At KingsGate School, aakonga|students can study academic NCEA subjects, and they are encouraged to maintain a subject range that will prepare them for NCEA Level Two and Three core subjects. NCEA Level One provides aakonga|students with the opportunity to earn 80 credits towards NCEA 1 Certification. The certificate and content will prepare aakonga|students for both academic and vocational Pathways found in Industry, Trades and Tertiary Study.

The **NEW ZEALAND CERTIFICATE IN FOUNDATION SKILLS (NZCFS)** supports aakonga|students who prefer a practical, hands-on style of learning. This course works well for aakonga|student working at



NZ Curriculum levels 3 to 5. They may find traditional academic classroom learning challenging. They may have gaps in literacy or numeracy, want a fresh start to re-engage with school, or would benefit from further preparation for NCEA 1-3 study..

Through the NZQA-approved SPEC program, KingsGate School aakonga|students will build focused skills , capabilities, knowledge and attributes needed for life, work and further study. The course aims to develop a positive mindset to learning, improve self-confidence, self-management, and motivation while providing the opportunity to earn 60 credits towards the NZCFS Level 1. The purpose of this qualification is to provide aakonga|students with a positive, holistic education experience that is part of the NZQA Qualification Framework and allows movement across to NCEA. It is a nationally recognised and recorded on aakonga|student NZQA Record of Learning. Students as part of this pathway will also participate in Year 11 NCEA learning and can step into NCEA if or when they have the confidence.

At KingsGate, this course leads to NCEA Level 2 English Achievement Standards, NCEA Level 2 English University Entrance literacy requirements, and possible course endorsement.

Course Statement

English is one of the three official languages of Aotearoa New Zealand. English is essential for full participation in our personal, local, national and global communities. The study of English supports aakonga in extending their competency in language use across various contexts, including tertiary study and the workplace. Aakonga develop a sense of their identity as New Zealanders and explore their heritage by studying novels, films, short stories and shorter texts from Aotearoa, New Zealand, the wider Pacific region, and worldwide.

They also develop critical thinking skills, which enable them to evaluate and challenge the thinking of others as well as contribute to critical global debates. Aakonga will also practise creating oral, written, and visual texts. They are encouraged to be curious and explore their understanding of identity, the world, belonging, and connection. In doing so, they explore a wide range of perspectives and draw upon different bodies of knowledge. This helps aakonga learn in other contexts and makes them lifelong learners.

What will I learn?

- NCEA Level 1 English emphasises the development of communication skills.
- Focus on understanding purpose, audience, ideas, language, and structure.
- Understand how language works to enable appropriate language choices.
- Apply language skills in various contexts.
- Study existing written, visual, and oral texts and create personal texts.



FAITH AND LIFE

At KingsGate, this course leads to Level 2, Faith and Life. NCEA Level 2 Religious Studies Achievement Standards, as well as Level 2 Classical Studies and Art History eLearning.

Course Statement

Faith and Life fosters a deeper understanding of the Christian faith and ethical principles in everyday life, providing aakonga with the tools to integrate Christian values into their personal and community experiences. It incorporates KingsGate's Christian Formation curriculum and NCEA achievement standards, which are focused on understanding and analysing from an academic perspective. Christian Living emphasises spiritual growth, character development, and practical application of biblical teachings. This subject encourages aakonga to explore how Christian beliefs can guide decision-making, relationships, and personal development, creating a well-rounded foundation for living out one's faith beyond the classroom. It also explores religious beliefs, traditions, and practices while offering assessment opportunities.

What will I learn?

- Faith and Life focuses on Christian living, learning, and building an understanding of a non-denominational Biblical worldview.
- Christian disciplines, lifestyle choices, apologetics, narratives, and ethics.
- Learn about and unpack Biblical worldview responses to non-Biblical worldview beliefs.
- Introduction to Biblical worldview understanding of and responses to world religions.
- Begin exploring worldviews, ethics, morals, and philosophy, including good and evil.



GENERAL SCIENCE

At KingsGate, this course leads to NCEA Level 2 Biology, Chemistry, and Physics Achievement Standards, as well as Level 2 Agricultural and Horticultural eLearning, and possible course endorsement.

Course Statement

Science is a discipline that provides a range of skills and ways of thinking that are valuable in many aspects of life and work. Have you thought about why you need to eat, why cars rust, how batteries produce electrical energy or why clouds produce rain? Science helps aakonga discover answers to such questions. Aakonga will explore not just the world of living things but all types of substances and how they react while gaining an understanding of concepts such as force and energy. Many issues that confront us today have scientific aspects, and many choices we make in life have a scientific perspective. This subject is not just about learning about science but also about understanding how to make sense of the scientific information we are bombarded with daily.

What will I learn?

- Explore the nature of science, sharpening your innovation and critical thinking skills.
- Develop scientific literacy and understanding of the world and mātauranga Māori.
- Support and challenge scientific knowledge.
- Generate and test ideas, gather evidence, and analyse data.
- Aim to understand, explain, and develop knowledge about the natural world.
- Observe and conduct investigations and model findings.
- Communicate and debate theoretical and practical aspects.



MATHEMATICS & STATISTICS

At KingsGate, this course leads to Co-Requisite Numeracy Alternative standards. NCEA Level 2 Mathematics, Statistics and Calculus Achievement Standards and possible course endorsement.

Course Statement

Mathematics is more than just numbers. It explores and uses patterns and relationships in quantities, space and time. Statistics focuses on patterns and relationships in data. Aakonga are equipped with powerful communication and problem-solving tools for investigating, interpreting and making sense of the world. Using symbols, graphs, and diagrams to investigate patterns and relationships, aakonga model real-life and hypothetical situations in various contexts: social, cultural, scientific, technological, health, environmental and economic. Mathematics and Statistics develop the ability to think creatively, critically, strategically and logically. Aakonga also learn to structure, organise, process and communicate information.

What will I learn?

- Mathematics and Statistics are related but involve different approaches to problem-solving.
- Mathematics explores and uses patterns and relationships in quantities, space, and time.
- Statistics examines patterns and relationships in data.
- Both disciplines equip aakonga with skills for modelling, analysing, and interpreting their environment.
- Enhance ability to make informed decisions, design and innovate.
- Develop skills to predict future outcomes.
- Critically evaluate information.

Pathways is a combination of unit standards and is not an NCEA NZQA University Entrance Subject, but it can contribute to the overall NCEA certificate endorsement.

Course Statement

Work, Study and Industry Pathways Education provides learning opportunities to develop the foundational skills required to transition successfully between school and work, be prepared for further education and move into paid employment or work in the voluntary sector.

What will I learn?

- develop skills and knowledge for the workplace.
- the foundation skills required to get ready for the workplace, health and safety, and employee skills
- personal budgeting and finance management, understanding receipts, invoices, and workplace calculations
- the skills to move successfully between school and further education - produce a CV, interview skills, filling out forms,
- self-management skills, including anger management, employment rights, and teamwork communication.

- recognition of learning to drive with your own Class 1 NZ learner driver licence.



COMMERCE

This course is assessed using

3+ internal and external

Achievement Standards

At KingsGate, this course leads to a Co-Requisite Numeracy Alternative (Commerce 1.1), NCEA Level 2 Business Studies and Economics achievement standards, as well as Level 2 Accounting eLearning, and possible course endorsement.

Course Statement

Commerce is a foundational subject that consolidates key concepts and prepares aakonga for further specialised Year 12 and 13 subjects. At NCEA Levels 2 and 3, Commerce includes Accounting, Agribusiness, Business Studies, and Economics. In this subject, aakonga build the knowledge, skills, and values they need to navigate and participate in the economic world. Studying Commerce will provide aakonga with a broad financial knowledge base to draw from in various roles and organisations in the future. Exploring the role of puutake in business operations will have aakonga weigh financial information in relation to social and cultural factors. They will learn how people make economic decisions and how cultural perspectives influence them. They will analyse how these decisions impact sustainability and how society can benefit from kaitiakitanga, tauhokoho, enterprise and innovation.

What will I learn?

- Develop the use of accounting, economic, and business concepts and models.
- Start to understand the economic world and human involvement in it.
- Begin to develop a critical understanding of decision-making processes.
- Explore the importance of resource utilisation
- Explore the functioning of businesses, organisations, and governments in resource management.



HEALTH & WELLBEING STUDIES

At KingsGate, this course leads to Hospitality, Early Childhood, NCEA 2 Health and/or Home Economics Achievement Standards,

Course Statement

Applied through a Christian lens, Health and Wellbeing Studies is a combination of science and humanities, encompassing Home Economics, Health Education, Pregnancy and Early Childhood and Food Technology. In this course, aakonga consider the influences on their wellbeing, attitudes and values and work towards promoting the health of their community. They will learn about and gain knowledge about pregnancy and the well-being of children up to five years old and will participate in a range of tasks, including considering ways to keep themselves safe in different situations and learning effective methods to communicate and develop healthy relationships.

Aakonga will learn about and explore issues related to ethics and health philosophies, which develop critical thinking skills. This course will prepare aakonga for further pathways in the health, hospitality and services sectors, and for interacting and understanding a range of age groups and social situations.

What will I learn?

- A blend of Food and Nutrition, Mental Health, Relationships, and Sexuality.
- Gain knowledge, skills, and understanding of well-being.
- Care for yourself, whaanau, and your community.
- Active learning and reflection.
- Preparation for further learning in Health and/or Food Technology (Home Economics)
- Pregnancy and early childhood development.
- Positive parenting, childcare techniques
- Facilities, help & support agencies and services for whaanau and children



SCIENCE EXTENSION

Type of Course Option - Semesters A and/or B for NCEA 2 preparation

Mode of Instruction Class-Based, KingsGate teacher

Assessment Provider KingsGate School

Recommended prior learning

NZ Curriculum Level 5 Science

This course is assessed using

2+ internal and external Achievement Standards

At KingsGate, this course leads to NCEA Level 2 Biology, Chemistry, and Physics Achievement Standards, as well as Level 2 Earth Sciences eLearning, with the possibility of course endorsement.

Course Statement

Science Extension adds an additional layer to the Year 11 NCEA General Science Course. It is recommended learning for all aakongas planning to study the science disciplines in Year 12 and 13.

Science Extension is divided into two semesters and focuses on the additional Biology, Chemistry or Physics NCEA achievement standards content necessary for success in Year 12 and 13 for NCEA 2 and 3.

What will I learn?

- Additional achievement standards and subject content that are required to support success in the NCEA 2 individual science disciplines: Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

Course Statement

Aakonga will refine their computational thinking skills and become informed users of digital technology. These everyday digital technology unit standards cover a broad range of desktop applications and cover many everyday applications and computer programs

What will I learn?

Foundational practical eSkills for applications like word processing, presentation, publishing and spreadsheet. Learning to create clear documents, simple spreadsheets and slides, manage files, edit basic images, and staging cyber-safe. Unit Standards include:

- Produce simple desktop published documents using templates
- Use computer technology to create and deliver a presentation from given content
- Produce a spreadsheet from instructions using supplied data
- Enter prescribed text accurately using basic keyboarding skills and identify safe ergonomic practices
- Compose and manage text to produce documents using basic keyboarding and layout skills

At KingsGate, this full course leads to NCEA Level 2 Certificate endorsement, possible Digital Technologies course endorsement when distance eLearning external standards are entered.

Course Statement

Digital Technologies focuses on building aakonga capability to apply technological ideas within a digital environment. Aakonga will become informed users and innovative creators of technology. It is a broad subject that covers many domains, for example: software programming, online environments and embedded systems, Digital information systems, and Digital media.

What will I learn?

Aakonga can develop computational thinking skills and the ability to apply concepts of introductory computer skills, including desktop publishing, presentations, spreadsheets and keyboarding, to the design and development of digital outcomes.. They will also learn how computers represent and process data — the fundamental material of the subject. Digital Technologies focuses on building aakonga capability to apply technological ideas within a digital environment. Aakonga will develop computational thinking skills and the ability to design and develop digital outcomes. They will also learn how computers represent and process data — the fundamental material of the subject.

- Computer software programming

Course requirement

Self-management and proven success with eLearning

This course is assessed using

1-2 internal and external Achievement Standards

At KingsGate, this course leads to NCEA Level 2 Earth and Space Science achievement standards for NCEA Level 2 Certificate Endorsement. It also supports NCEA Level 1 and 2 science and geography.

Course Statement

Earth and space science is the study of planet Earth, Te Whaanau maarama (the family of objects in space) and the broader universe. It includes the investigation of processes and phenomena on Earth, as well as the exploration of celestial bodies, galaxies, and the cosmos beyond our planet. Key aspects of Earth and space science are geology, environmental science and astronomy.

What will I learn?

- This course is mainly theoretical, drawing from the level 1 science matrices.
- It adds depth of understanding for aakongainterested in Science, Geography, Geology, and Astronomy.
- Develop knowledge, discover answers and explain more about the natural world, space systems and beyond.
- Explore topics like how the Earth works, Earth sciences, Earth systems, and the atmosphere.
- Explore environmental science.

At KingsGate, this course prepares aakongas for NCEA Level 2 Health or eLearning Home Economics, with the possibility of earning NCEA Level 2 course endorsement and credits.

Course Statement

The Health Studies Extension Course builds upon the Semester A Year 11 NCEA Health Studies achievement standards studied in the Health and Wellbeing Course. It provides course survey content, learning, or exam preparation for the two Health Studies external assessment Achievement Standards.

This course is recommended as extension learning for Year 11 aakongas planning to study Hospitality, Health, or Home Economics/Food Technology in Years 12 and 13.

What will I learn?

- Content learning and entry in externally assessed Health Studies achievement standards
- Factors that contribute to well-being, food choices
- Strategies that enhance well-being and change

At KingsGate, this full course leads to NCEA Level 1 Certificate endorsement and NCEA Level 2 Kaupapa Māori.

Course Statement

Kaupapa Māori is a learning area rich in Te Ao Māori skills, knowledge and topics. There is a wide variety of kaupapa to explore and engage in, and ample opportunity to connect learning from a Māori context to other NCEA subjects.

What will I learn?

Māori Performing Arts: Māori Performing Arts is where identity and culture is shared through the creation and performance of waiata, dance and movement. In this subfield you will explore how to perform moteatea, waiata-a-ringā, haka, poi and contemporary Māori dance.

Reo Māori: Te Reo Māori through Kaupapa Māori is a pathway for learners who are looking to express themselves using everyday language constructs.

Tikanga: Tikanga is all around us every day and influences how we behave in certain situations and how we interact with others. It is our connection to the past and the present.

Whenua: Whenua examines the interconnectedness Māori have with āpapatuanuku through the investigation of various species, rakau and the marama. In this subfield you can explore how the whenua is used to sustain life and consider how we could better sustain the whenua.

Hauora: Hauora explores two major concepts; personal wellbeing and whānau (or collective) wellbeing. This subfield encourages ākonga to explore principles of hauora, how these relate to whānau wellbeing and practical skills needed to help lead a healthier life.

Environmental Māori: Environmental Māori provides the chance to explore the world around you and to investigate the importance of the delicate relationship between humans and the Earth. In this subfield you have the chance to learn more about native birds, insects, waterways and forests. You can explore what it means to be a kaitiaki and how you can play an active role in helping your local community.

At KingsGate, this course prepares aakonga for NCEA 2 Geography, History, Classical Studies, Media Studies, with the possibility of NCEA 2 course endorsement and credits.

Course Statement

Geography explores the relationships and connections between people and te taiao, the interconnected domain of land, water, weather, and life. Aakonga learn to think spatially and use maps, visual images, and new technologies to obtain, present and analyse information. Geography can be studied at the tertiary level as a science or a humanities subject. It leads to a wide variety of careers in environmental and urban planning, as well as the public sector.

History is the study of the narratives of people, places and events that have shaped the world we live in today. Studying History supports you to develop key skills for the modern world: finding accurate information through research, evaluating the validity and authenticity of that information, and writing reports based on evidence. It teaches how to distinguish fact from opinion. Studying history develops the soft skills of empathy and evaluation. It gives us insights into the motivations, perspectives and decision-making of people.

What will I learn?

Geography: aakonga consider the question of 'what is where, why there and why care' in relation to topics about te taiao, both here in Aotearoa and globally. Te taiao encompasses natural features, including rivers, mountains, and landforms, as well as the cultural aspects of people, buildings, and infrastructure. Te taiao can exist at different scales and can be located wherever we place ourselves. Aakonga will learn to think spatially and obtain, analyse, and present information about:

- Population: spatial patterns, distribution factors, NZ population distribution, migration, urbanisation, push/pull, rural drift, urbanisation
- River environments: data, NZ river environment research

History: aakonga will have the opportunity to look at causes and effects, as well as the continuity and change of historical narratives, by studying the following aspects of Aotearoa History:

- The 1951 Waterfront Strike and Springbok Tour
- Imposed injustice and inequality - 19th-20th Century Māori

Course Statement

Legal Studies covers a range of topics, aiming to provide an understanding of the role of law in society and the basic processes and principles of the New Zealand legal system. Legal Studies explores and evaluates the ability of the legal system to provide just outcomes for all individuals and groups, giving aakonga better understanding of their legal rights and responsibilities. Aakonga will develop an appreciation of how the legal system impacts their lives and how they can influence and change it.

What will I learn?

- Explore law as an integral aspect of society, including concepts of democracy and government.
- Understand the law-making process and how laws are made, developed, and applied in everyday life.
- Demonstrate understanding of the characteristics of effective laws and New Zealand's court system.
- Understand how New Zealanders vote for an MMP government.
- Explore legal rights, responsibilities, the rule of law, separation of powers, and civil liberties.
- Evaluate the legal system's ability to provide justice for all, e.g. coercive power and impartiality.



PRIMARY PRODUCTION

At KingsGate, this full course leads to possible NCEA Level 1 certificate endorsement.

Course Statement

Agriculture and horticulture are two main parts of New Zealand's primary industry sector. Primary industries form the backbone of many New Zealand communities and are the country's biggest export earner. Primary Production is about producing living things from the land and water. This includes producing and rearing large livestock, such as cattle, sheep, pigs, and deer, as well as smaller animals, including poultry, bees, and earthworms. Aquatic animals, including fish and shellfish, are farmed in New Zealand's freshwater and marine environments. Plants are grown in large-scale forests, plantations, vineyards, fields, smaller-scale market gardens, and gardens, as well as in landscape design. Through engaging in this subject, aakongawill build an understanding of where food products come from and what has contributed to their production, helping them become more conscious consumers.

What will I learn?

- An introduction to agricultural and horticultural production and primary products in Aotearoa.
- Begin to understand soil, livestock, and plant management within production systems.
- Develop an understanding of the interconnectedness in the growing environment.
- Covers aspects including people, soils, water, climate, plants, and animals.
- Explore sustainable environmental, social, cultural, and economic practices.
- Focus on innovation in response to economic and environmental challenges in primary production.

Course Statement

Introductory Level 5 DVC will appeal to individuals who enjoy sketching and are interested in the challenge of solving design problems. Aakonga learn design and drawing techniques, which enable them to design everyday objects and present them visually. They will include influences from their cultural and physical contexts in their design projects. Topics include product and spatial design, sketching, rendering, modelling and instrumental drawing.

NCEA 1 Design and Visual Communication, also known as Graphics, is for aakonga interested in design and drawing who would like to develop skills in sketching, rendering, drawing, and modelling to explore, communicate and present their ideas. They will develop visual communication skills and design thinking to explore and solve design problems. Aakonga are encouraged to generate creative and innovative solutions to solve design problems set in authentic contexts, which can be customised to suit their interests. To create purposeful and future-focused design ideas, learners must be willing to experiment, develop, respond to feedback, and reflect on their design thinking to improve and refine their proposed ideas.

What will I learn?

- discover how to give form and expression to ideas.
- develop skills in design research, design ideation and design communication.
- explore visual communication combining sketching, rendering, drawing, and modelling to explore, communicate and present design ideas.
- develop visual communication and design thinking skills
- explore and solve different design problems in either spatial design or product design contexts.

Aakonga develop their speaking and listening skills, as well as reading and using the unique kanji writing system, which can be a rewarding and enjoyable experience. Aakonga will find knowledge of Japanese very helpful if they plan to travel to Japan or host Japanese visitors.

What will I learn?

- NCEA Level 1 Japanese builds on basic skills acquired in Beginners Japanese.
- Broaden your knowledge of the Japanese language and culture.
- Work towards increasing communication ability in Japanese, focusing on written and spoken Japanese.
- Use spoken and written Japanese to express information, ideas, and opinions about familiar everyday contexts.
- Activities will help integrate reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills.
- interact with others in culturally informed ways, reflect on personal identities and explore their culture(s) from a new perspective.

Appendix 2: NCEA FAQs

NCEA Courses

- Schools can design NCEA courses to reflect the learning needs of their ākonga/students. They can contain standards from one or more NCEA subject lines and/or NZQA unit standards.
- Their length can be one or two semesters, completed over one full academic year.
- A short course may sometimes be offered via Careers Trades through individual learning pathways
- February to November. Three full terms, with term four exam preparation and study leave.
- Each week of term, every course is allocated four hours of on-site face-to-face class learning.
- In addition to four hours per week per course, personal study is required to meet the requirements of NCEA assessments.
- Personal study can include personal study at school, catching up on missed work or assessments, working on coursework, completing assignments and assessments, revision and off-site study leave,
- supervised learning from home, on-site or off-site study leave and internal and external assessments.
- NZQA assessments occur throughout the year.
- External assessments include portfolio submissions and on or off-site NZQA exam centre locations (e.g. KingsGate School, Pukekohe High School).

NCEA Teaching & Assessment @ KGS

MODE OF INSTRUCTION: Class-Based teacher ASSESSMENT PROVIDER: KingsGate School

The KingsGate teachers and faculties have planned the course content, ensuring that sole-subject teacher courses reflect Te Kura assessment standards (in the event of unplanned teacher absence). The KingsGate NZ registered teacher has understanding of the subject beyond the taught level. They may have a particular interest and strength in the subject, have studied some papers at the tertiary level, or hold higher qualifications than the level they teach. Class-based subject teachers provide on-site learning, and are the primary contact point for all aakonga|student needs relevant to the specific course.

KingsGate plans the course, assesses and moderates tasks, grades submissions, ensures authenticity, and organises standard enrolment and assessments per NZQA requirements. KingsGate organises course enrolments, ensures internal and external authenticity requirements are met, and arranges external assessment locations.

Suits the following aakonga:

- **Benefit from structured, class-based learning:** Prefer face-to-face instruction and consistent in-person support from a subject specialist.
- **Value personalised teacher interaction:** Appreciate one-on-one guidance with a dedicated KingsGate teacher.
- **Need consistency and reliability:** Rely on stable course content aligned with NZQA standards and maintained even during teacher absence.
- **Appreciate expert guidance:** Want teachers with a deep subject knowledge and qualifications beyond the taught level.
- **Aim for clear academic and assessment pathways:** prefer courses with clear authenticity requirements, deadlines for assessment submission, and internal and external assessment requirements that are consistent and often spaced out across the school year.
- **Comfortable with institution-led direction:** Prefer the school to plan and oversee course content, internal assessments, and external exam logistics.

They are registered teachers, possessing a particular skill in the subject, and often hold a tertiary qualification similar to the course subjects they teach.

Like all New Zealand registered teachers, eTeachers plan and organise their lessons, provide onsite learning and teach the Te Kura Kaiako teacher content, lessons and directed assessments. KingsGate eTeachers direct lessons, plan timeframes for assessments and guide and mentor aakonga, monitor TKKaiako feedback. They understand the standards conditions of assessment, and will unpack requirements with aakonga and facilitate and monitor the delivery and submission of all aakonga assessments. They ensure that aakonga communicate and liaise with their TKKaiako. The class-based eTeacher is the primary contact point for immediate aakonga course needs, and they liaise with the TKKaiako to understand and support feedback that aakonga receive.

Te Kura assesses the course, and aakonga are dual enrolled with Te Kura and KingsGate. It is Te Kura that arranges the course content and assessment. A New Zealand registered subject kaiako/teacher and learning department plans the course overview, direction, and content, assesses all work, and is employed by Te Kura. The TKKaiako assesses, moderates and confirms assessment tasks and awards grades. KingsGate works with Te Kura to ensure authenticity and reports grades from Te Kura to NZQA.

Suits the following aakonga:

- **Appreciate a class-based teacher who can teach and mentor course-related needs:** Learners who require consistent support and communication with a dedicated teacher to address content and assessment.
- **Self-motivated and able to benefit from dual support:** Learners who can handle feedback and support from both Te Kura and KingsGate.
- **Thrive with ongoing monitoring and feedback:** Learners who need regular progress check-ins, tracking, and mentorship.
- **Seeking flexibility within a structured environment:** Learners who benefit from both KingsGate teacher guidance in a structured classroom setting and guidance and monitoring from both Te Kura and KingsGate. Flexibility with internal assessment submission timeframes - can submit them a short time after the KingsGate due date has passed.
- **Needing extra support with assessments:** Learners who benefit from accessing two modes of support, guidance, feedback, and moderation.



MODE OF INSTRUCTION: Distance eLearning

ASSESSMENT PROVIDER: Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu

When the course is identified as eLearning with self-directed distance eLearning, Te Kura is the Assessment provider, and a Te Kura kaiako (TKKaiako) teaches aakonga/student. The aakonga must independently follow all learning content on their Te Kura Course landing page. This includes knowledge, skills, and assessment. KingsGate High School teachers have often identified that eLearning aakonga already hold the necessary correspondence and distance learning skills to self-direct their learning (see 'self-directed distance learning' page).

For each eLearning course, aakonga complete four hours of supervised on-site in the eLearning classrooms, and a KingsGate teacher is present. These aakonga will liaise with their TKKaiako and with their KingsGate eLearning staff member.

For eLearners, the TKKaiako is the primary contact point for all aakonga needs relevant to the course. An allocated eTutor or allocated staff member is the KingsGate on-site academic support for aakonga.

Distance eLearners are fully independent with only general support staff. They work independently in another subject classroom for their year group, and as they mature, may work in the ILP eLearning rooms, the school library or negotiate off-site study with their Dean/Head of High School. eLearning aakonga are supported by the HOH, Principals Nominee and the eLearning Coordinator. They have the necessary skills to initiate their learning needs and liaise with their TKKaiako and KGS eTeaching support staff when required.

Suits the following aakonga:

- **Independent and self-motivated:** Learners who can manage their time effectively and take initiative without constant supervision.
- **Strong communicators:** Learners can express their learning needs, ask for help, and interact directly with their Te Kura kaiako (TKKaiako) and KingsGate support.
- **Disciplined and organised:** Plan workload, meet deadlines, and balance supervised learning with independent study.
- **Comfortable with eLearning platforms:** Proficient in Te Kura systems to access learning materials, submit assessments, and track their progress.
- **Collaborative when necessary:** Works alongside peers studying Te Kura modules while staying focused on personal progress.
- **Adaptable and flexible:** Manage on-site or negotiated off-site study with school staff.
- **Mature and responsible:** Handle the responsibility of self-directed study and make informed decisions, including the ability to seek support when needed.
- **Open to check-ins and feedback:** Value feedback and periodic check-ins with the TKKaiako KGS eTutor/eCoordinator/KGS staff member, and reflect on their progress and assessments.



New Zealand eTeaching, assessment & eLearning with Te Aho o Te Kura Ponamu

At KingsGate, Te Kura is available under the Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu Enrolment and Dual Tuition Policy. It is a Year 0-13 New Zealand state school and a distance learning provider. KingsGate's partnership with Te Kura is a wonderful opportunity not available to all schools. It will contribute to all Senior High NCEA qualifications, allowing KingsGate to offer a broader range of learning courses and subjects. Te Kura also prepares aakonga for future learning that requires independent study and distance learning.

For many NZ state secondary schools, Te Kura is an integral part of their education options as it is not privately funded (fees only cover KingsGate School's property costs). The government offers Te Kura dual enrolment to state and state-integrated high schools for several reasons:

- Like all state schools, the number of enrolled aakonga|students determines government teacher funding at KingsGate. The budget is limited; in general terms, one full cohort of aakonga can fund one New Zealand registered teacher every school year.
- At the High School level, the number of subject courses that individuals are interested in far surpasses the funding received from the government. Consequently, Te Kura is available to support schools in financially managing their distribution of government-allocated and funded teacher staffing.
- Te Kura provides schools with a sole-subject/course teacher backup option. KingsGate ensures that the class-based, on-site NCEA standards are also available through Te Kura. This ensures that if a qualified sole subject teacher takes an unplanned absence, the course and assessments can be immediately picked up via Te Kura. This alignment with Te Kura creates a backup option. Aakonga cannot risk being withdrawn from their enrolment in NCEA assessment standards if a subject teacher becomes unavailable.
- A reliable supply of subject course teachers is a genuine concern for all state and state-integrated schools. KingsGate only employs Christian teachers. This means there is always the possibility that a sole subject teacher may leave, an advertised position is not being filled, or fewer qualified teachers are available who uphold KingsGate's Special Character.



APPENDIX 4:

Guided and Distance eLearning Required Applicant Information

ENTRY REQUIREMENT

To be eligible for distance eLearning, aakonga|students must demonstrate established distance learning skills, including:

- consistent self-motivation, engagement, and achievement
- monitor requirements independently
- meets with and seeks support from their Te Kura Kaiako, eTutor or eLearning Coordinator
- manage their time, and consistently submit work
- independently responding to feedback and resubmitting work
- proven independent study skills, a history of personal responsibility

COURSES

- Distance eLearning courses are designed to complement class-based courses offered in school.
- eLearning courses are offered based on available KingsGate subjects, staff expertise, government funding, and aakonga consultation.
- Aakonga must select a KingsGate School Option course or can apply for an eLearning option.

ASSESSMENT

- Te Kura eLearning assessment standards are required, and regular submissions of work are to be made to Te Kura Dropboxes.
- KingsGate High School staff will work with aakongato plan their distance learning, with support from whaanau and consistent aakonga commitment.
- This structure and information applies to all Te Kura eLearning courses.
