YEAR 13 BIOLOGY

On Tuesday this week, Year 13 Biology students put on their wellies and other wet gear and headed off to the Kaniwhaniwha Stream in the northern environs of Mount Pirongia. Ms Rymer and Ms McCann were along as support crew doing the driving and offering guidance. The weather was perfect; a cool day with cloud cover, so no rain or beating sun to contend with. The biologists' mission was to gather data for their current NCEA Standard and use it to report on the number and distribution of a chosen species of small, stream dwelling creature without a spine. These creatures have favourite spots to live, for instance where there's fast flowing water and/or the water is very clear. The pictures show students using equipment to collect and look at the creatures, and equipment to measure water speed and water clarity. No-one was afraid of getting wet, no matter what it took to get that data! Students had a great day out and got a glimpse of what being an ecologist out in the field might be like, which helps to make connections between classroom theory and real world biology.

Year 10s have spent time working with whānau on an heirloom and have created books to document the whakapapa of these heirlooms and the importance of these precious taonga to their whānau.









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
