


It is great to see Year 9 students and others from the local primary schools being inspired and educated about science and technology.


MATHEMATICS FACULTY Transformational Geometry

To make the learning a more hands on experience Year 9 Roto got to work with playdough again! It has been a few years since most of the students had their hands on playdough so there was a fair bit of excitement in B1.





The challenge was to make a series of shapes that showed some of the following concepts being explored. Enlarging a shape by a whole number as well as using a fraction of a number that resulted in a smaller shape than the original. Students were also exploring rotation around a point in either a positive direction or rotating anticlockwise. The most obvious use of the playdough was creating a symmetrical shape using a mirror line in the middle of the shape either horizontally or vertically.





You may also notice a bit of creative license sneaking in with a snowman and spiderman appearing in the math lesson.

The final advantage of using the playdough was to remind the students about the volume of shapes when a slightly thicker trapezium or two turned up on the desks.

YEAR 8 WHAKAWHANAUNGATANGA INTERVIEWS
