As the fog ascended in the early hours of Tuesday April 2nd 2024, whānau, hapū, community gathered to remember the battle of Ōrākau. Fires were lit, significant flags were raised, karakia recited, it was time to remember the many tupuna who had fought for the whenua and the right to assert sovereignty 160 years ago. Among the thousands that came to remember this significant day were our senior student leaders Takarei Bidois and Luke Coles.
