After leaving school I went to work for the local photographer, while waiting to join the police force, which was much more difficult to get into in those days. Very restricted as to what a female was allowed to do. I enjoyed photography so much that I never left, and I still have a love of photography now.

What do I do at Huntly College you may ask? Some students wonder that too. My role here is varied and if I said I was the receptionist at Huntly College, you couldn't be blamed for thinking, "well you don't do much".
