R.E. REFLECTION



What our children are learning at St Patrick's School

Over the next few weeks all classes with be looking at Catholic social justice teachings using resources provided by our Catholic aid agency, Caritas New Zealand.

Catholic social teaching is a core body of Catholic doctrine that provides a moral framework for how Catholics should live in society. Rooted in scripture, tradition, and the teachings of popes and bishops, it addresses issues of human dignity, social justice, and the common good. It holds key principles that we teach children about and examines how we as Catholics can live and show these principles to others, especially those less fortunate than ourselves.

- **Dignity of the Human Person:** This is the foundational principle. It holds that every person is created in the image of God and is therefore sacred and has inherent worth. All other rights and responsibilities flow from this fundamental belief.
- **The Common Good:** Society should be organised in a way that benefits all people, especially the most vulnerable. It's about working together to create a just and peaceful world where everyone can flourish.
- **Solidarity:** This principle emphasises that we are all part of one human family, regardless of national, racial, or economic differences. We are called to stand in unity with our brothers and sisters, particularly those who are marginalised or suffering.
- **Subsidiarity:** Decisions should be made at the most local level possible. This principle respects the capacity of individuals and communities to address their own problems and encourages participation in society.
- **Preferential Option for the Poor and Vulnerable:** A just society is measured by how it treats its most vulnerable members. This principle calls on individuals and communities to prioritise the needs of the poor and those on the margins.
- **Stewardship of Creation:** We have a responsibility to care for God's creation, the earth, recognising that all of creation is interconnected and that we are part of and dependent on the environment.
- **Rights and Responsibilities:** Human dignity can only be protected and a healthy community achieved if human rights are protected and corresponding responsibilities are met.

The lessons and resources used for social justice teachings aim to connect students to global issues that affect others. They will review aid work that Caritas, the New Zealand Catholic aid agency, does and how they, along with aid agencies, can make a real difference in the lives of people around the world.

Promoting reflection and action: Caritas encourages a "See, Judge, Act" process, which is a traditional method for applying Catholic Social Teaching. Students are guided to:

- **SEE** social justice issues as they affect society.
- **JUDGE** what is happening and why in light of Catholic principles.
- **ACT** to respond to the issues with concrete actions.

Amen.


