

PRINCIPAL'S EDUCATIONAL COMMENT

- TE WHAIKŌRERO O TE TUMUAKI

Kia ora Koutou

Recently I have had to speak to a number of students in relation to their *choice* of behaviour. I spent some time talking to them all about *choices* we make and the *consequences* resulting from those *choices*. Too many times I am faced with students who are quick to look towards *Blame*, *Excuse*, *and Denial* to explain their actions. As I continue my dialogue with them, I point out that they actually need to take an *OAR* (*ownership*, *accountability*, *and responsibilty*) to row themselves out of the situation they are in. The key realisation is that all actions come from *Choices* we make, and that we need to take ownership of those *choices* before we can move forward. It would be a good opportunity as parents to continue this conversation at home so that children realise that this is a life skill and not just a school focus.

I foresee a busy year for the Parkvale School Board, with a lot of cogs already in motion, and I am excited to see what the rest of 2024 will bring for us!


