Tena koutou katoa nga mihi ki te whānau o te Kura o Kōpūtai - greetings to all families of Kōpūtai (Port Chalmers) School.

Kiaora folks,

Incorporating hands-on activities into the school curriculum not only enriches learning experiences but also provides pupils with valuable life skills. This term, in Rumā Mangō, pupils have been learning how to use hand tools to create model waka hourua (traditional Polynesian catamaran style boats). By creating model waka, pupils can better understand Māori traditions, craftsmanship, and navigation.

This hands-on Aotearoa Navigation Social Science project has allowed pupils to engage with the history of the early Polynesian settlers in a way that books or videos alone cannot provide. It fosters a deeper appreciation for the Māori worldview, their respect for the environment, and the art of navigation that guided their ancestors across the Pacific. Learning how to use hand tools, such as small saws, knives, clamps, files, hammers, hole punches, pliers and cutters teaches students essential practical

These tools allow children to create, while improving their hand-eye coordination and dexterity. As they work through the stages of building their model waka, they learn the importance of patience, attention to detail, and perseverance. These experiences help to build confidence, as they can take pride in their creations, knowing that they made them with their own hands.

Building a model waka is not just about following instructions—it encourages pupils to problem-solve and think critically. They may encounter challenges, such as shaping pieces of wood or ensuring the structure holds together properly. These challenges stimulate creative thinking and teamwork, especially in a collaborative environment. As pupils work together to figure out solutions, they develop communication and collaborative skills that will benefit them in other aspects of their education and later in life.

In a world of mass production, learning traditional craftsmanship promotes an appreciation for quality over quantity. Pupils gain an understanding of the effort, skill, and time that goes into creating something by hand.

Helping our kids build a deeper understanding of their heritage and encouraging them to be practical will encourage them to be someone who values cooperation, creativity and sustainability.

Grab some kids tools or use your own during the School Holidays. Enjoy the sharing of the skills you have!


<u>Tiaki</u> - to care for, look after, guard (kaitiaki - quardian, trustee)


<u>Taonga</u> - treasured possessions or cultural items; anything precious


# Family Works - help to have a warmer, dryer home and reduce power usage




