Changes to Our School Report for 2025

Kia ora whānau,

We want to explain some changes you will see in our school reports this year, particularly for English (Reading and Writing) and Mathematics.

As a result of a curriculum review led by the Ministry of Education, the English and Mathematics areas of the curriculum are now set out in year levels which has resulted in a review of expectations. The curriculum expectations for each year level have been updated and raised to align with international standards.

Please note this crucial point: Because the refreshed curriculum sets a higher bar for what students need to know and when they need to know it, your child's reported achievement may seem different from previous years. Lower reported achievement does not mean your child's learning has declined; it means the standard they are being measured against has been raised.

Your child's report will show one of the following descriptors for mathematics and reading and writing:

What this means for Your Child Working Towards

Your child is at the beginning stages of learning the core knowledge and skills required for their current year level. They need additional teaching and support to develop the necessary understanding

Working Within

Your child has demonstrated a solid understanding and mastery of the core knowledge and skills expected for their current year level. They can consistently complete tasks accurately and independently.

Working Beyond

Your child is demonstrating an advanced understanding of concepts, knowledge, and skills beyond the expectations for their current year level, and they require extension/enrichment activities.


The reports will be given to tamariki on Monday 12th of December.
