Poetry

"Poetry is a playground for children — there are no rules and it can begin in the air/ear without crippling expectations. The sophisticated reader and writer can advance; the struggling reader and writer falls in love with words." Paula Green - poet and creator of the Poetry Box - A New Zealand Poetry page for children

When children write poetry, it enriches their language and vocabulary, encourages creative thinking and develops reading, writing, speaking and listening skills. All children benefit from writing poetry even reluctant writers can experience success from the creative but scaffolded nature of poetry that happens in classrooms.

Here are some of the many benefits of poetry.

- 1. Helps with spelling: A focus on rhyme helps children look at patterns within words and how they are formed, supporting word recognition and spelling.
- 2. Speech development improves: Playing with sounds and rhyming patterns in words supports speech and language development.

- 3. Reading becomes more fluent: The tunes and patterns of poems support children in developing reading fluency, making poetry a perfect vehicle for engaging reluctant readers, as well as encouraging more confident readers to pay closer attention to the words on the page.
- 4. Allows children to develop their own opinions: A poem is not a puzzle to be solved: there is no right or wrong answer when children are talking about poems or sharing opinions about what they are listening to or reading, which can give them confidence in expressing their views to others in the class.
- 5. Inspires creativity: Well-chosen poems can help inspire children to become writers themselves. They gain a sense of voice, think carefully about their subject matter, language, grammar and style through writing poetry of their own. Children can experiment with different writing devices like simile, alliteration and onomatopoeia to make their writing more dynamic and exciting.
- 6. Encourages a wider vocabulary and varied grammar: Poetry plays with language. Writers of poetry make deliberate choices in the way they use words and punctuation for the ultimate effect on the reader. Reading well-written poetry allows children to look at ways to compose ideas effectively, using the best language, consider layout and the most appropriate punctuation to convey meaning.
- 7. Transports them to new worlds: Poems provide entertainment and escapism, whether that's through witty rhymes that make children giggle or mythical poems that transport them to a different space and time.


Poems from Rūma Tepetepe
