Launchpad is a not-for-profit organisation that presents Christian Values Education in primary schools under the name Launchpad Champions.

Welcome back, everyone!

Kia Ora and welcome to Term 2. I hope that everyone had a relaxing and refreshing break. I had a great break with family.

We welcome Luna-May to Tawa's class, bringing our total to 11 students.

We're starting the term with our Anzac Day learning.

We are preparing for Mother's Day and learning about Pink Shirt Day. Pink Shirt Day is about working together to stop bullying by celebrating diversity and promoting kindness and inclusiveness. It's about creating a community where everyone feels safe, valued, and respected.

King's Birthday Celebration – Tawa Class We are excited to celebrate the King's Birthday on Friday 30th May! Tawa class are invited to dress up as Princes, Princesses, Kings, or Queens for the day. Our special celebration plans will be revealed soon — watch this space!

Matariki Celebration Week 8 and week 9. We have been learning about Matariki and its importance through stories, art, and classroom activities. We are excited to celebrate together at our Whānau Celebration in Week 9 — more details will be shared in our News Flash!

Hells Reading Challenge

Homework

While we have a no homework policy at school, reading books and some activities in home books will be sent home this term. There will be reading books every day, from either guided reading with me or from fluency boxes. It is totally normal for the same

book to come home for weeks on end. This is completely normal as we work on our loop fluency in reading. Practicing the letter names and sounds of the alphabet will assist with increasing reading skills.



This term, Phase 1 learners will continue their maths journey with PR1ME Mathematics, aligned with the refreshed New Zealand Curriculum. The new maths curriculum focuses on helping students notice patterns, connect ideas, solve problems, and explain their thinking, building deep understanding rather than memorising facts.

Our students will explore numbers to 10 — learning to count, recognise, and order numbers, and beginning early addition and subtraction through fun, hands-on activities. They will also work with shapes, sort objects, and learn to notice patterns in their environment.

We will build on these ideas, working with numbers to 20, developing part-whole thinking, making tens to solve problems, and introducing early ideas of multiplication and division with equal groups. They will also measure, compare lengths, and use everyday maths in real-world contexts.

Throughout the term, learners will be encouraged to talk about their thinking, work together to solve problems, and find different ways to explain and check their ideas. Literacy: This term, we are excited to continue our Structured Literacy journey using

the iDeal

programme. Our focus will include developing spelling strategies such as howell sounds, open and closed syllables, the Flossy Rule, and Magic E. Reading learning, closely link to our spelling learning, emphasizing building fluency and accuracy. Students will bring home weekly spelling words to practise and reinforce the strategies we are learning. Please return spelling books daily. In addition, students will bring readers to help develop their fluency — these may include books that have not always been read with the teacher first. Games may also be sent home from time to time further to support literacy development in a fun and engaging way.

We will also explore parts of speech, including nouns, verbs, adjectives, and more. Our comprehension activities will help deepen understanding and support all areas of literacy development. As always, our programme is aligned with the refreshed New Zealand English Curriculum, with a strong focus on oral language, reading, writing, and spelling. We look forward to seeing our learners continue to grow and succeed!

Reading

We will continue to have a focused shared book, allowing us to explore the nuances of written and oral text. During the term, there will be lots of interactive exposure to shared reading. Guided reading sessions will happen weekly, with lessons geared toward each child's reading needs.

Tawa visits the library every Friday to choose their books and class books to enjoy. The senior class also buddy read with the Tawa class.

Writing

Writing will be encouraged through discussions, provocations, and the sharing of ideas. In the first 4 weeks, we will focus on writing about Anzac Day, Mother's Day, and Pink Shirt Day by learning how to Grow a friend. Further Writing will come from Shared Books, Our Inquiry on NZ birds, and Structured Literacy.

This overview is what we intend to teach this term. Incidental teaching may mean abandoning plans. Flexibility is an essential requirement of teaching and learning! I feel that home and school communication is of high importance. Because you are integral to your child's education, I encourage you to tell me anything you think is important. The best way to contact me is through email or the school office. If you would like to talk in person, I can schedule appointments before or after school. Please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions or concerns.

Karaka Class Newsletter Term 2 2025

Welcome back to term 2 in Karaka. We are looking forward to an action packed term of learning :

How our week will work

Monday to Wednesday Mrs Williams will be teaching all day in the Karaka space, Thursday and Friday Mrs Steeghs will be teaching all day in Karaka. Both teachers will be covering aspects of Literacy including reading, writing and spelling as well as following the Prime Maths sequence as our main learning tool for Mathematics.

Home Learning

A reminder all students should try to read to someone each day, we will be taking part in the pizza/reading challenge again this term, more details to follow. Spelling lists with words from the previous week are sent home each week for students to work on reviewing at home.

Main Topics to be covered this term

Number: Addition and subtraction will be the main number focus this term along with times tables.

Strand: Measurement

Writing: Writing structures for informative writing

Reading: decoding skills, comprehension, vocabulary

Spelling: floss rule, soft g, soft c, ck vs k, ch vs tch, ar, 3 sounds of ed and double the

consonant rule.

Science: Forest Health and Wonderful Wai

Art: Anzac art, use of dye, sketching

Music: learn to identify elements of music through focused listening **PE**: Winter Sports/Matariki **Technology:** becoming familiar with email, google docs, how to find things in their drive and google classroom.

Te Reo: Whaanau/Matariki

Aotearoa Histories: Local Stories

Class Novel: Wild Robot Escapes
