#### Kia ora koutou,

My name is Sharon Udy. Many of you will have seen me around Takaro over the last few terms as I worked here often as a relief teacher. I am very excited to be teaching fulltime with the amazing kaimahi and tauira at Te Kura o Takaro.

I lived in Palmerston North as a child, and have a lot of whānau living in the Manawatū. A few years ago, I brought my two tamariki back to my hometown after many years of travelling and living away. Christina is in Year 8 and Semi is in Year 5, and both will be at Te Kura o Takaro with me.

## **COMMUNICATION**

This will clarify the different platforms we use and what they are for.

**FACEBOOK** - all events, reminders, event photos, class updates, sports draws and school information is shared on here, we also check the messages once a day but not always during school time. So this is not the place to send an important message. We also periodically go live for events to ensure everyone can be a part of our day. Day to day information will go on here first - eg if events are cancelled or postponed.

**EMAIL** - We are in the process of setting up a new website and on this will be all staff emails. Please feel free to email staff about anything, staff check these afterschool. All staff will send an email next week to the students in their class this year which will include their contact email.

**SCHOOL PHONE** - PLEASE call the school for anything that is time sensitive or important, this is the best way to ensure that we receive information in a timely manner. If I am not available straight away I do my best to call you back as soon as I am free.

**OFFICE** - the office staff are available 8.30am - 9.30am each day, I am also around if you need to see me about anything. It is always best to book an appointment if this is important. This can be done by ringing the office.

**SKOOL LOOP** - this is a free app that houses our school calendar, permission slip portal, instant messages, school newsletter and is also where you can log an absence as this is checked daily.

**SKOOL LOOP** - we have used this app over 5 years and have not been able to get more than 60% of whānau connected. Staff spent a lot of time posting and sadly had minimal engagement. To the few parents who used this a lot we appreciate your comments on posts and likes. In the end it was used mostly as a message portal. As you see from the above, the number of platforms we are running is becoming too many to manage realistically.

Staff will be meeting over the next month to talk about ways to connect with whānau using the feedback we have received from the whānau hui survey so thank you for that information.

## **ATTENDANCE PROCESS**

It's really important that you know how all our systems work. Attendance being a very important one.

If your child is absent and you do not call, send a message in Skool Loop, reply to the text or leave a message on our school phone

• attendance is marked as T - truant

If you reply late to the text we do adjust the code

If your child is sick they get marked with M- medical, but after 3 days if we do not receive a medical certificate then your absence moves to E - explained but not justified.

If your child is absent for 2 weeks and we do not hear from you during this time, and none of our attempts are responded to then your child COMES OFF OUR SCHOOL ROLL - this is an MOE process that we must follow.

This is really important to know as you will need to make an appointment to re-enrol your child. At this meeting we will check contacts are correct and then talk about our attendance process and make a plan.

## **OUR GOAL - ATTENDANCE**

This year one of our goals is attendance and working to improve this across all year levels. Across the region our statistics were average but we can improve and as we all know attendance has a direct correlation to academic achievement.

Here is a breakdown of what regular in-attendance can look like over time. One day here and there does not seem like much, but when it is regular over a number of years it can equate to quite a deficit.

We hope you will work with us to help support your whanau in getting all our tamariki to school regularly.
