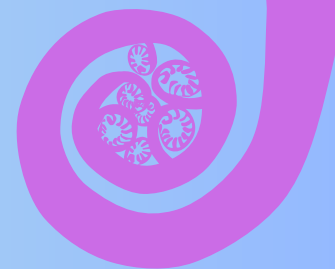

I want to thank all whānau, staff and students who have supported our school this year and wish you all a safe and happy holidays.

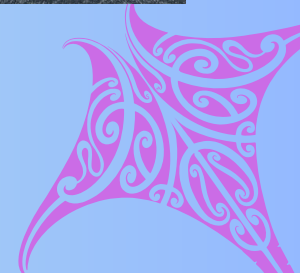
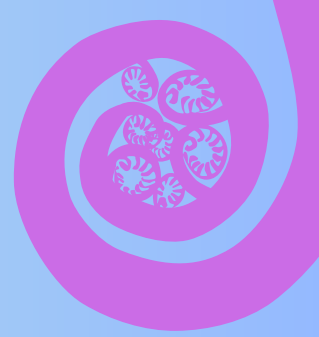

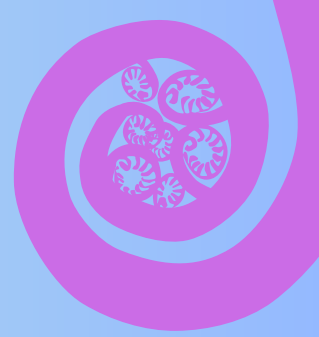
