Kia ora e te whanau - another big week for New Zealand schools. Consequently, we start this week's newsletter with a message from our Board of Trustees:

The government changed the Education and Training Act 2020; passing it through the third reading in Parliament iust this week.

Section 127 of the Act, previously guided school boards via a set of primary objectives that covered academic achievement, student wellbeing, inclusion, safety, equity and honouring Te Tiriti o Waitangi. It clearly charged boards to holistically care for, and enable kids to reach their potential in a safe, inclusive and culturally responsive environment. That has all changed. There is now just one overarching objective academic achievement.

Totally unheralded last minute changes completely removed any obligation for school boards to give effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi. (Also removed was the independence of the Teachers Council. Neither change was consulted upon - not even at select committee level).

The latest (largely imported) 'Stanford curriculum' severely downgrades the quality of learning to match the testing regimes being implemented. While academic achievement is important; effective education requires so much more than just knowledge that can be tested; an approach that assesses little more than an individual's ability to memorise information.

The Waverley Park School Board of Trustees wants all of our learners to do well academically. Our kids bring a wide range of needs, interests, strengths and challenges that we need our school to cater for well. Poorly designed, culturally inappropriate, one-size fits all curricula; combined with inadequate, misfit testing; won't do that.

Our board is concerned that these drastic changes to legislation, severely undermine what we value in our school, and the education we want for our kids.

Consequently, Waverley Park School remains fully committed to honouring, and giving effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Irrespective of government policy, we will work with our whanau, hapu, iwi, and wider community to continue doing so.



8.00am - too soon? Yup - too soon.


In the interests of child safety - please make sure that your kids don't get to school too early.

All school grounds are deemed to be open thirty minutes before classes start. Typically, that's 8.30am but in our case, it's 8.20am (our classes start at 8.50am) and our staff are usually committed to getting everything set up for the day.

So: for the sake of their safety, please make sure that your kids don't arrive at school before at least 8.15am. While we usually have a staff member supervising road patrol teams from that time; we cannot guarantee that we will consistently have adult supervision available before that time. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation they are as appreciated as they are necessary.

Whooping cough...

Unfortunately, it's in our school. The official advice is:

"Children with whooping cough are advised not to attend early childhood services, school or other public places for three weeks from when they started coughing or five days after starting antibiotic medicine. Adults are advised not to attend work or public places for the same periods of time.

Close contacts of a person with whooping cough who attend early childhood services, are in contact with infants less than 12 months of age or pregnant women, or who are health care workers, can complete a course of antibiotic medicine to reduce their risk of developing the disease. A whooping cough booster immunisation will not prevent the disease developing if there has been a recent exposure." You can find out more at:


