While this government claims to be "moving at pace" in the education space; this is only partially true. In actual fact, the government's pace is demonstrably variable.

- ill-advisedly reckless (curriculum change)
- arrogantly reckless (sidelining Te Tirīti)
- snail-like (a teacher aide in every classroom)
- stationary (employment agreement negotiations)
- reverse (school lunches programme)


What's worse, most of the change happening "at pace" is demonstrably underpinned by election deals, rather than sound educational research. If ever there was a time to divorce education (and health) from partisan politics, it is now. As it stands, every three years, the education system is heavily impacted by the outcome of an election: sometimes minimally sometimes not; sometimes positively - sometimes not. Our kids deserve better.

Meaningful curriculum change takes a lot longer than three years. Kids don't have any choice - they have to be at school. The very least the kids, their families, and their schools deserve is a stable, long-term plan for education; a plan that is underpinned by high-quality educational research; one that only changes according to the research, irrespective of who is in power. Schools falling victim to the party politics of the day has to stop.
