Kia ora e te whanau

Te Wiki o te reo Māori - also the last week of the term - has been a very busy one. Aside from ongoing illnesses impacting kids' attendance rates:

- the habitual procrastinators among us have been racing to meet deadlines (which have been known for weeks);
- there's been a disco (two, to be exact);
- the results of our BOT elections have been posted;
- school photos were taken (on the only other day of the week when you could do so outside).

"So, why is it called a disco?" A very fair question. 'Disco' is a shortened form of the French word *discothèque*, which originally referred to a "record library" and later, to a dance club where recorded music was played instead of live bands. The term originated in Paris during the 1940s and spread to English-speaking countries, where "disco" became the common slang term for both the music genre, and the nightclubs that featured it. "Disco" is still in use today, but it's all digital - laptops and streaming - not an actual disk in sight.

Strike action - pending...


Like nursing; teaching is a caring profession with a female dominated workforce. And, as it is with nurses; educators are always very reluctant to go on strike. It's very safe to say that when educators and nurses get to the point where industrial action is deemed necessary (<u>Thursday 23 October</u>); you know that things are getting pretty dire. In pushing back, government spokespeople invariably hone in on salaries; largely referencing only the top end of the salary scale in doing so. And they largely ignore any of the other issues that are hugely concerning.

In the interests of transparency and clarity: we are striking for much more than money. While there are several areas of concern, the major issues are that the Government's offers

- do not match the rising cost of living;
- fail to provide sufficient support in classrooms;
- overlook the need for greater recognition of Te Tiriti and Te Reo Māori

Back in 1976, starting salaries for a teacher and a backbench MP were very similar. Today, the backbencher starts with a base salary of \$163,961 (you can check out the rest here). That's just the salary; it doesn't include the perks. In comparison, the starting rate for a teacher is currently \$61,329. To rub salt into the wounds: MP salaries are regularly adjusted for inflation. Had the same approach been applied to teacher salaries since 1976, the starting salary would be \$140,584 - just by keeping up with inflation alone. (see graph in the next column).

Should some commonsense and fairness be injected into the government's offers; strike action can be averted... but don't hold your breath.


