

NSSSA Volleyball Championships




Our Swimming Sports Day was run on Friday the 6th April. This year our students were met with a cold chilling wind but bravely took to water for their competition swims.







English

Senior English

This year, 12 and 13 courses are combined and are offered both English and History credits. Students are completing the first assessments in these courses and preparing for the next two internals due by the end of Term 2. Goals are:

- 13 ENG/HIS University entrance (1 approved subject English) + course endorsement
- 12 ENG/HIS UE literacy through internal assessments + course endorsement
- 11 ENG are working through the new Level 1 English standards, the first focusing on how verbal language is used for specific purposes. Learning throughout the year will support the external examination in Term 4. This course offers endorsement.

Hair care Nit Shampoo and combs are available - parents please phone me if you need the products and come for them.


