Study leave is not a given over this period, and ONLY students who are clearly on track to achieve their respective level of NCEA will have the ability to take study leave. Remaining students' timetables will continue to give them the best opportunity to complete assessments and pass NCEA.

Have an excellent term break, and we will see you all in Term 4.

Tēnā koutou e te whānau,

The Commissioner and I would like to advise our staff and community of the outcome of the recent review by the Education Review Office. The review team came in April 2025 and their report was confirmed in August 2025.

Our plans identified that we had prioritised working to improve attendance, engagement and achievement and strengthening schoolwide leadership that would be evidenced by a positive learning climate for students and staff, improved attendance, progress, achievement, and the retention of senior students; curriculum leaders, including the Special Education Needs Coordinator (SENCO) monitoring, and reporting to the board in relation to strategic priorities and annual improvement targets; a curriculum that engages learners in high interest; and meaningful programmes that encourage students to lead their own learning and student and teacher voice regularly collected to make ongoing adjustments to improvement initiatives.

ERO found that while progress had been made on some fronts that overall limited progress has been made against these priorities. ERO highlighted some things they found or that we shared.

- Less than 50% of our students achieve NCEA Level 1,
- Just over 50% of our students achieve Level 2
- Very few of our students achieve Level 3 or University Entrance (UE).
- Few students in Year 9 and 10 are at the expected curriculum levels in reading, writing and mathematics.
- Very few students attend school regularly and a number are chronically absent from school.
- We are yet to put in place fully the organisational conditions and systems necessary to support strategic improvement, strengthen key areas and improve student outcomes.
- We need to ensure high quality teaching to support improved learner outcomes and engagement in learning.
- Have higher expectations to support students' success, to raise attendance and achievement, and to provide students access to meaningful pathways.
- We need to better collect and use reliable achievement data to know about the strengths and needs of our learners and to have the skills and knowledge to adjust our teaching practices to cater for these.
- We need to use a range of evidence-based strategies to engage students in learning.
- Ensure and deliver a student-centred, coordinated and cohesive curriculum that emphasises the foundational skills of literacy and mathematics for our learners.
- The next step is to better identify, track and monitor of students with additional



- learning needs, to enable the provision of high-quality learning support.
- Leaders and teachers are beginning to communicate regularly with whānau; they
 continue to strengthen this engagement to support whānau to know about their
 children's learning, achievement, and engagement at school.
- Leaders and teachers are developing practices to better promote learners' confidence in their identity, language and culture to improve engagement, retention and attendance.

While we disagreed on some aspects, we did agree on many. We were heartened by many of the foundations ERO identified that our improvement journey can leverage off namely:

- Leaders at our school are aware that there is opportunity and a need to improve what
 and how we work to ensure we achieve the school goal of All learners are
 empowered to succeed.
- The positive impacts from a focus on staff developing positive and mutually respectful relationships in the classroom are increasingly evident.
- The majority of our students said they experience settled environments that support learning.
- We are taking steps to provide an inclusive environment.

As a result from the governance and management levels of the school from the beginning of term 4 we will be prioritising a relentless focus on:

- Improving student engagement, attendance and achievement.
- Strengthening the whole of school leadership and accountability of learning, including improvements to systems, processes and practices for managing learning and success.
- Supporting teaching quality to ensure as a whole school we have consistent, high quality teaching practices and a coherent curriculum.
- Ensuring that the school conditions and culture is conducive to enabling all learners to be empowered to succeed.

The Commissioner and I will be collaborating as Governance and Management for a planned approach to improvement to:

- Strengthen school-wide strategic planning and actions to set measurable goals and targets for student attendance, engagement achievement, progress and retention to the end of 2027. This will be monitored.
- Review and better align school systems, processes and organisational conditions to better support attendance, engagement achievement, progress and retention.
- Ensure we have reporting and monitoring giving visibility and transparency to governance, management, staff, students, community and stakeholders about the progress being made towards higher attendance, engagement achievement, progress and retention.
- · Ensure support for improved pedagogy and teaching practices, assessment and



- support systems to raise achievement, engagement and retention with staff.
- Use data powerfully to monitor and track the impact of initiatives on student outcomes and achievement.
- Strengthen school leadership capability at all levels to best support improvement.
- The school has begun a support system for regularly observing teaching and learning and using feedback and support to improve teaching practices across the whole school that supports and achieves higher attendance, more engagement, higher achievement, this will be strengthened.
- All members of staff will have access to and use as part of our professional practice reliable information for positive initiatives and daily practice in student attendance, engagement and achievement.

We will know we have been successful only when there is:

- Raised achievement outcomes for all students' and levels of attendance and engagement in learning.
- We can evidence we have quality teaching, effective assessment practices and student support systems that are raising learner outcomes.
- We have empowered and strengthened leadership with a clear understanding of progress, information led decision-making, and continuous improvement toward achieving the non-negotiable goal of All learners empowered to succeed.

We accept and embrace these challenges and opportunities to improve. We will keep you abreast of the solutions and efforts we intend to make and implement to go from good to great.

Weekly training sessions

Junior and senior students from various local schools, including a sound cohort of enthusiastic students from our college, are actively participating in weekly volleyball training sessions every Friday at the Papa Hawaiki Sports Complex, from 4:00 pm to 6:00 pm. These sessions foster skill development and community among students from different schools.

Local volleyball competition

Following the training sessions, the Papa Hawaiki Sports Complex hosts a local volleyball competition from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm. This competition features mixed teams, including adults, recent school leavers, and students from primary, intermediate, and high schools. This provides a fantastic opportunity for players of all ages and experience levels to participate in friendly yet competitive matches, further strengthening the local volleyball community. We, too, have a very energetic, competitive staff team participating as well.

The Papa Hawaiki Sports Complex is a state-of-the-art facility that opened in April 2024. Year 9 Arts Extra (Weaving)

In our Year 9 Arts class, we have been privileged to have local weaver Medina Koni visit once a week since the beginning of term 3. Medina's sessions focus on teaching traditional weaving techniques and stitches essential for creating korowai, kākahu, and maukaki (neck pieces), which are significant Māori garments and adornments symbolizing cultural heritage and artistry. Her guidance has provided invaluable support (āwhi) to the students, enriching their learning experience with hands-on cultural education.

Medina joins the class every week to demonstrate and instruct on various weaving methods. The curriculum emphasizes:

- Basic Weaving Techniques: Introduction to foundational stitches
- Advanced Stitches for Korowai, Kākahu, and Maukaki: Detailed lessons on specific patterns for maukaki (neck pieces), such as whatu (weft twining). These lessons focus on intricate, smaller-scale designs suited for neck adornments.
- Cultural Context: Medina integrates cultural significance behind each technique, helping students appreciate the whakapapa (genealogy) and mana (prestige) associated with these garments and adornments.

These weekly sessions allow students to practice under expert supervision, building skills progressively throughout the term.

The program has had a profound impact on the Year 9 students:

- Skill Development: Students gain practical arts skills that blend creativity with precision, particularly in crafting detailed maukaki, fostering patience and attention to detail.
- Cultural Awareness: By learning traditional Māori weaving, including maukaki, participants deepen their understanding of te ao Māori (the Māori world), promoting cultural pride and respect.



• **Engagement and Support**: Medina's āwhi has created a supportive environment where students feel encouraged to experiment and ask questions, leading to increased confidence and enthusiasm for the arts.

The ongoing collaboration with Medina Koni has transformed our Year 9 Arts class into a vibrant space for cultural and artistic growth. Her inclusion of maukaki alongside has enriched the students' learning, offering a diverse range of traditional Māori weaving practices. We are grateful for her dedication and look forward to continuing this program in future terms. This initiative not only preserves traditional weaving practices but also inspires the next generation of artists and cultural ambassadors.

Connecting Cultures: From Māori Migration to South-East Asian Flavours

This term, we've had a fantastic time exploring the historical connections between Māori and other cultures. We kicked things off with the fascinating documentary series, Origins, with Scotty Morrison, to understand the incredible journey of early Māori migration. We then put our new knowledge into practice by exploring the bold and balanced world of South-East Asian cuisine, which shares some of the same cultural roots. We learned that these dishes are built on a masterful balance of four key flavors: sweet, sour, salty, and spicy. To cap it all off, we got hands-on in the kitchen and made a delicious Indonesian Mee Goreng, a dish that perfectly combines these flavors. It was a wonderful way to connect our learning to a delicious and memorable experience!















Senior Mathematics

Level 3 Mathematics & Statistics

Our students are currently completing their final mathematics assessment, worth 4 credits, which will contribute to the 14 credits required for University Entrance in Mathematics. Throughout this demanding course, they have consistently displayed grit, determination, and perseverance, as well as collaboration, pride, and integrity. Their commitment to overcoming challenges and striving for success is commendable and a credit to each of them.

Level 2 Mathematics & Statistics

For the greater part of this term, our focus has been on algebra and calculus, the two external achievement standards that students will sit in their end-of-year examinations. In addition, they still have two internal achievement standards to complete in Term 4. This course has proven to be particularly challenging, and students are now recognizing that greater commitment, effort, and application will be required to make further gains.

Level 1 Mathematics & Statistics

Students have completed the second round of US 32406 (CAA, 10 credits) and are on track for achievement standards 1.1 and 1.2 (10 credits). Some of our cohort have earned extra numeracy credits through Commerce, and all have the chance to attempt the external achievement standards 1.3 and 1.4. Well done on their hard work and perseverance.

Junior Mathematics

Our junior school cohort has been engaged in a wide range of topics across the algebra and number, measurement and geometry, and statistics and probability strands. A select group of students also had the opportunity to sit the CAA—Common Assessment Activity (online/web-based), worth 10 credits. With continued effort, application, and commitment, students are well placed to make higher gains as they continue their learning journey.

English Department



Senior English

This has been a busy and productive term for both senior and junior English students. Our seniors have been focused on completing their internal assessments while also preparing for the recent mock examinations. Well done to everyone who attended and gave their best effort during these exams!

Why are the Mock examinations important?

- 1. **Derived grades** Mock exam results may be used as derived grades if you are unable to attend the official external exams in Term 4 for a valid reason.
- 2. **Exam experience** Sitting the mock exams gives students valuable insight into the structure and pressure of the externals, helping you feel more prepared next term.
- 3. **Targeted learning** The results allow teachers to identify strengths and areas for improvement, so we can focus on the most important learning next term.
- 4. **Endorsement opportunity** Most senior English students already have at least 10 credits. Therefore, passing the external exam will provide the extra 4 credits (from an external standard) needed to earn an English endorsement qualification.






Learning in a Cup: Social Studies Explores the World of Tea


