


Taitā Central School Newsletter

Whaea Michelle has been our te Reo Teacher at Taitā Central School since 2021, sharing her knowledge and expertise in ter Reo me Tikanga Māori with our ākonga and staff. As I said in my kōrero during her farewell - When I first met with Whaea Michelle as a new principal she said to me "My goal is to do myself out of a job!" and 4 years later, we have come to the time where Whaea Michelle feels confident to leave us to continue on our journey without her... although we will still reach out to seek her guidance and support and to connect as whānau of Taitā Central School.

Through the knowledge and skills Whaea Michelle has instilled in us all we will continue to be bound together with a shared purpose; we will work together to ensure that our ākonga/students are immersed in Mātauranga Māori. This indigenous knowledge encompasses a holistic understanding of the universe from a Māori perspective. It includes a wide range of knowledge, skills, and values, passed down through generations via oral traditions, such as whakapapa (genealogy), waiata (songs), and pūrākau (stories) along with purposeful, real world authentic learning experiences which will enable our ākonga/students to engage in a wide range of learning experiences which we hope will inspire and equip them to be the best they can be.

On behalf of our Board of Trustees, our staff, our ākonga/students, whānau, aiga and community, I would like say "Ngā mihi nui tō mahi i tēnei kura," We thank Whaea Michelle for all the work you have done at Taitā Central School, by sharing your knowledge and your wisdom you have enabled us all to fly, and wish her well in her new endeavor.







Attendance, Engagement, Achievement

In the last newsletter I stated that during Term 3 we had 30 tamariki who were at school between 95% and 99% of the term. These tamariki will be presented with their attendance certificate at our next school assembly. We did not have any tamariki who were at school 100% (every day) during Term 3. — I need to make a correction, after looking more closely at our school eTap data I can confirm that we had 22 tamariki who were at school between 95% and 99% of the term and we had 9 tamariki who were at school 100% (everyday) during Term 3.
