Filmed at Kauwhata Marae in the Manawatu, *The Beginner's Guide to Visiting the Marae* is a straightforward and respectful explanation of basic marae protocol, from the wero, to the karanga, pōwhiri, whaikōrero, waiata, koha and the hongī. The programme was made in 1984 when Pākehā were generally less familiar with visiting marae, so host Ian Johnstone presents the documentary from the perspective of a person rather more apprehensive about marae protocol than might be the case in 2013! That aside, the doco remains an effective primer for 21st Century marae novices.
