

He had a very deep connection with New Zealand and ended up living there. He sadly passed away on the 19 of February 2000. Did you know he was buried here in NZ!!!

Life in Austria

Friedensreich Hundertwasser grew up in Vienna, Austria . He was born

there on December 15, 1928, his original name was Friedrich Stowasser


but he changed it to Friedensreich Hundertwasser when he was 20. His mother was Jewish and his father was Catholic. His father died when he was

still a baby. He was baptized Catholic and joined the Hitler youth to stay safe but never joined the army. So he pretended to be Catholic so Hitler would not kill him.


His early life

Hundertwasser was born in Austria in 1928, and his real name was Friedrich Stowasser. He lived in Vienna with his Mum because his dad died when he was little. His mum was Jewish, and when the Nazis took over Austria, life became very dangerous for them. They had to hide their religion to stay safe, and many of their family and friends didn't survive. Even though things were really scary, Hundertwasser still loved to draw and spend time in nature. He didn't like straight lines or anything too perfect—he thought nature was more interesting. Later



on, he went to art school, but he didn't stay long because he liked learning and creating in his own way. Travelling to different countries gave him lots of ideas for his colourful and creative art.




His life in NZ


When Hundertwasser came to NZ he designed 2 buildings. One at the Kawakawa toilets and one in Whangārei. His favorite place in NZ was his property near Kawakawa in the Bay of Islands. He died on Queen Elizabeth the 2nd from a heart attack at the age of 72 in the Pacific ocean. He was buried in NZ under a Tulip tree.


