

Council is gathering feedback from the community on the Draft Dangerous, Affected, and Insanitary Buildings Policy.

The intent of the Dangerous, Affected and Insanitary Buildings Policy is to reduce the risk of injury, death, ill health or damage that may occur as a result of dangerous, affected, and/or insanitary buildings.

Council has reviewed the current Policy and is proposing some changes to bring the Policy up to date and to make it clear how Council identifies, assesses and manages these buildings.

The Statement of Proposal summarises the proposed key changes in the Draft Policy and the two options out for public consideration. These are to either adopt the Draft Policy or to retain the current Policy.

The Statement of Proposal, Draft Policy, current Policy, and submission forms are available at Council's offices, libraries, the Ngakawau Community Centre, the Karamea Information Centre or on Council's community engagement hub Let's talk Buller.

The outcome of this consultation will guide Council in keeping our community safe from dangerous, affected, and insanitary buildings.

How you can join the conversation

Paper form: Pick one up at Council's offices, libraries, the Ngakawau Community Centre, or the Karamea Information Centre. Submission forms can be dropped off at the libraries and Council's offices.

Submissions are open from Monday 9 June until 4:30 pm Friday 11 July 2025. Late submissions will not be accepted.

If you own and have registered your dog, you should receive your dog registration form at the end of June.

Once you have received your form, you can call into Council offices in Westport or Reefton to pay and pick up your red tag.

Prices this year are:

Desexed - \$69.50 | Entire - \$89.50

If you use your dog principally for herding or droving stock your dog is eligible for our working dog rate.

Desexed - \$52.50 | Entire - \$67.50

Dogs that support a person with a disability or medical condition may not be subject to registration fees, at the discretion of the Compliance Manager.
