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Competition Time



The colouring competition has four age groups: under 5s, 5-7 years, 8-10 years, and 10-12 years.


Please note: due to height requirements, children under five won't be able to ride in the rally car but will receive a goodie bag and a special meet-and-greet with the drivers instead.



School Board Elections

A Parent's Perspective on the Coroglen School Board

With the Board elections upon us, I wanted to share my experience so far as a parent representative on the Coroglen School Board. I was co-opted onto the board at the end of 2023, and my journey has been incredibly rewarding.

I was initially interested in joining because I wanted to be part of the Principal hiring committee. Having had children at this school since 2007 and with more to come until 2030, I felt a strong desire to contribute as we shaped the school's future. Being on the hiring committee was a fascinating process, from interviewing candidates to managing the logistics. We received great support from the NZSTA and the Ministry of Education (MOE), and that guidance has continued throughout my time on the board.

I came into this role with no prior experience and was unsure if I had what it took, but I've quickly learned that it's okay to ask questions and that the learning curve is manageable. While I was concerned about the time commitment, it has been surprisingly easy to balance with a busy family life.

The board is responsible for:

- Employing school staff.
- · Managing budgets.
- · Reviewing policies and procedures.

It has been truly interesting to gain insight into how Coroglen School is run. I have learned a lot in a short time, particularly the importance of teamwork and clear communication. Most importantly, as a parent, I get to see firsthand the school's unwavering commitment to doing its best for our children.

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School Board Elections

Parent Election Notice Nominations are open for the election of 3 parent representatives to the school board. All eligible voters will receive a nomination form. Use this form to nominate yourself or someone in your community. You will also receive a nomination cover letter calling for nominations. Information on who is not eligible to be a board member is provided with this notice, and the nomination form.

If you need more nomination forms, contact the school office.

Nominations close at noon on 6th August 2025. You may provide a signed candidate statement and photograph with your nomination.

The electoral roll is held at the school and can be viewed during normal school hours.

As nominations are received, there will be a list of candidates' names kept at the school up until election day, which you can view.

Voting closes at 4pm on 10th September 2025.

Notice 1A Sample Parent Election Notice (notify community)

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People who are not eligible to be school board members

The following people are not eligible to be school board members. A person who:

- is an undischarged bankrupt; or is prohibited from being a director or promoter of, or
- being concerned or taking part in the management of, an incorporated or unincorporated body under the Companies Act 1993, or the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013, or the Takeovers Act 1993; or
- is a permanently appointed member of the Board staff, unless they are standing for election as a staff representative; or
- contracts or sub-contracts with the Board without the approval of the Secretary of Education and receives payments exceeding \$25,000 in any financial year. This would also cover situations where a person has a 10% or more shareholding in the contracting company or a company that controls the contracting company; or is subject to a property order under the Protection of Personal and Property Rights
- Act 1988; or
 - has been convicted of a specified offence identified in Schedule 2 of the
- Children's Act 2014, unless that person has obtained a pardon or been granted an exemption; or is a person in respect of whom a personal order has been made under that Act that
- either the person is not competent to manage his or her own property affairs, or does not have the capacity to communicate/make decisions relating to his/her welfare/personal care; or
- is a person who has been convicted of an offence punishable by imprisonment for 2 years or more, or who has been sentenced to imprisonment for any other offence, unless that person has obtained a pardon, served the sentence, or otherwise suffered the penalty imposed on the person; or
 - is not a New Zealand citizen, and is -

a person to whom <u>section 15</u> or <u>16</u> of the Immigration Act 2009 applies; or a person obliged, by or pursuant to that Act, to leave New Zealand immediately or within a specified time, being a time that was less than 12 months; or deemed for the purposes of that Act to be in New Zealand unlawfully.

A returning officer for an election (or by elections) of board members is not eligible to be nominated as a candidate in that election.

Did you know?

A school board is the governing body responsible for the overall direction, governance, and strategic leadership of a state, state-integrated school, or kura.

Every state and state-integrated school and kura in New Zealand has a board.

It is the legal entity of the school and remains constant, regardless of changes in its membership.

In New Zealand, school boards (which used to be called "boards of trustees") were established through the Education Act 1989, placing local communities at the heart of decision-making.

What do boards do?

Boards work in partnership with their school, community, and the government to ensure the best for all ākonga (students).

They are responsible for the overall performance and strategic direction of the school.

The Education and Training Act 2020 sets out the objectives for all school boards.

These focus on ensuring all ākonga can reach their highest possible level of educational achievement in a safe and inclusive place that gives effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

Boards are responsible for:

- Setting the school's strategic direction in consultation with the community, parents, whānau, staff, students and the wider school community
- Developing policies, procedures, and bylaws to ensure the school meets its legal obligations Monitoring and evaluating student learning
- outcomes
 - Overseeing the management of personnel,
- curriculum, property, finance, and health and safety
 - Being a good employer of all staff in the
- school
 - Reporting on the school's progress to the
- community and the Ministry.

Boards do not get involved in the day-to-day running of the school. That is the principal's job.

How do boards and principals work together?

Boards and principals work together but have different roles.

Boards govern their school or kura, and principals are responsible for the day-to-day management. Governance and management work together in partnership.

The principal is both a member of the board and acts as the board's educational leader and chief adviser.

Who sits at the board table?

Boards are a mix of school-based members and members from the wider school community.

School-based members include the principal, a staff representative, and a student representative for schools with students above Year 9.

Community members are typically represented by 5 parent representatives. This number depends on the size and structure of the school or kura.

Boards of state-integrated schools, kura kaupapa Māori, and designated character schools can have different memberships. For example, state-integrated schools have members appointed by the school's proprietor.

Boards may also co-opt additional people.

No matter how they join, everyone has ōritetanga (equal standing).

This means all board members have equal voice and say on the issues discussed, an equal vote, and equal accountability.

Can the public attend board meetings?

Board meetings are open to the public, but they are not public meetings.

This means anyone can attend, but they cannot speak unless the board permits them to do so.

School boards help shape futures

Giving every ākonga in our schools and kura the opportunity to learn, grow, and thrive.

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What attributes can help a board member succeed?

Every board member brings their own unique experience and skills, but here are some things that will help any board member:

- Enthusiasm for student success
- Working well in a team
- Showing commitment and a willingness to learn
 - Not being afraid to ask questions
- Good communication and people skills
- Honesty, integrity, and empathy.

What support is there for board members?

Whether serving your first term or fifth, you can always learn something.

We're here to support all board members on their journey with a vast selection of learning opportunities, resources, advice and support.

To learn more, head to tewhakaroputanga.org.nz What's the time commitment to be a board member?

The time commitment varies. Most boards hold 2

to 3 meetings per term, each lasting about 2 to 2.5 hours.

Board members also spend time reviewing documents and preparing to attend a meeting.

Are board members paid?

Yes, every board member gets paid to attend board meetings.

This payment (called an honorarium) helps ensure there are no financial barriers to attending meetings.



Who can become a board member?

School staff, students (Year 9 and above), parents, caregivers, whānau, and people in the wider community.

Actually, anyone who meets the eligibility criteria can become a board member.

There are members from all backgrounds and walks of life.

Diversity and varying perspectives on a board give it strength and allow true community representation.

It doesn't matter what you do – it matters that you care about education in your community and making a difference.

Why join a school board?

Being a school board member gives you the opportunity to make a positive impact.

It's a great way to contribute to your community, and it directly benefits ākonga.

Plus, you'll collaborate with new people, build relationships, and learn lots about governance. How can you become a board

member?

Next time there's an election or a vacancy on the board, put your hand up!

Triennial elections are held every three years to elect parent and staff representatives; some boards also have a mid-term election 18 months later.

Student representatives are elected every year in September.

Occasionally, a by-election may be held to fill a vacant position, and some boards choose to coopt extra members from time to time.
