SCHOOL PHOTOS....





Voting in the elections...

Last week, we held an election in Kereru. It was just like the public vote, but just within our own class. First we had a look at who the candidates were and what they had to offer. came part of the total anonymous count. The box remained secured until the close of the election. On Monday morning, the box was opened (unsealed) and our votes were counted by the electoral team. This process ensured the privacy of the vote and determined the outcome of the election.
