School Donations

Roseneath School receives the minimum amount of Government funding to run our school. These funds are sufficient to cover the core infrastructure and operations of the school. Beyond this, the school has to meet its own needs. We are very fortunate that the school has the support of its community. More than a quarter of our operating revenue comes from the school community through parent donations and fundraising. Guidelines have recently changed around how we communicate other requests for your financial support- including for our Education Outside of the Classroom (EOTC) experiences such as trips and activities, and digital subscriptions for learning programmes like Mathletics. You will see these itemised on your Contribution Request. As a school we believe that these activities and opportunities are an important part of the broad learning experience that your child receives at our school, and we really appreciate your ongoing support so that they can continue.

In 2023 we are asking for a \$350 donation per child. If you are wanting a receipt for the donation part of the contributions to the school, please request one from the office. Don't forget that any donations that are paid can be claimed from the Inland Revenue on IR526 Tax Credit Claim form each year. You will be able to claim back 33% of your donation. Should you find it is not manageable paying the contributions for your child as a lump sum, please contact Joanne to set up a payment plan.

Dogs at School Policy

We have noticed an increase in the number of dogs on the school grounds which has prompted the Board to adopt a Dogs at School Policy to keep our children safe. If you are bringing your dog to school please read the following:

Dog owners

- Dogs must be kept on a leash always held by an adult.
- Leashes must be short, or if extendable kept under 2 metres.
- No adult may have two or more dogs in their care.
- Dog owners should help educate children on how to best approach their dog.
- Owners must take measures to avoid dogs marking or toileting anywhere on school grounds,
- And must promptly remove any mess left by their dog and including washing the area down.

School grounds

- Dogs are not allowed inside school buildings.
- Dogs are not allowed in the parents waiting area outside Aft and Lower Deck.



- Dogs must not be left tied up unattended on school grounds for any amount of time.
- Dogs must be kept away from any entrance to the school grounds or buildings, and must not stop on any pathway, so people who wish to can move freely around the grounds without coming near a dog.

Dog behaviour

- Dogs must remain gentle, calm and quiet on school grounds, including when interacting with other dogs, or be promptly removed.
- Any dog or breed considered by the Council, school staff or any other authority to be menacing, dangerous or in need of muzzling is not allowed on school grounds.
- Dogs are not allowed to drink from school water fountains.

Te Reo o te Wiki - Origins of Te Hongi

The hongi, a touching of noses, is known around the world as a New Zealand greeting yet not actually used by all Kiwis. But with the resurgence of all things Māori, could that change?

The origins of the hongi held an important role in Māori mythology.



The god Tāne-nui-a-Rangi, moulded the shape of the first woman, Hine-ahu-one, from earth and breathed life into her by pressing his nose against hers. Tane is considered the progenitor of Te Ao Māori (the Māori world), and that is where the breath of life came from.



How to Respond to Whining



Whining is often a sign that your child is struggling with something or feeling overwhelmed. Telling our children to stop whining doesn't address the root of the problem and can make them feel like their feelings are not important.



Remind them you are on their side Instead of "Stop whining. You are "I'm on your team! Let's brainstorm some ideas on how to handle this. I'm here to help." exhausting." # Give them the confidence to work through it themselves Instead of "There is nothing we "That sounds tough. You are creative and can do about it." hard-working. What could be your first step?" **# Validate their feelings** Instead of "I can see that you are really upset. Let's talk "Stop complaining!" about something else while you cool down." ***** Practise gratitude Instead of Try "You're being dramatic. "Sounds like a tough day! What's one thing It's not that bad!" that went well today?"

Remember to praise your child then they work through their feelings: That was a really frustrating situation for you. You came up with such a good solution!" * "I know we didn't get to do everything you wanted. I'm really proud of your flexibility!" Model gratitude and a positive attitude when you face frustration: "Today is going to be super busy, but I know we can handle it." "This recipe did not turn out how I expected, but it still tastes pretty good!"
