An inspirational talk from a strong and resilient Champion – William Pike

On the 27th of February, we were fortunate enough to be able to go to Rangī Ruru Girls' School to listen to the one and only William Pike share about his struggles in 2007 till now. He had been stuck underneath cold volcanic rocks after they came through the door of his hut up Mount Ruapehu. His story was one of not just surviving but thriving in life after this terrible accident.

William shared his real life experiences with 300 year 7/8 students and teachers in that short hour. Over 120 schools, just in New Zealand, have taken part in the Challenge programme which has a helpful and positive impact on our communities. William showed us to never give up no matter how hard life may seem. As I say there is always sun after months if not years of rain. William has made a huge impact on the kids he sees daily.

Due to the inspiration, I'm going to see if I can potentially volunteer at the S.P.C.A. and/ or see if I can read to people at an old people's home. I might do something building wise.
