Why is the regular classroom teacher not in class with my child today?

Teacher Classroom Release time and Professional development days.

Recently you will have seen in the media information about a concern regarding Staff / Teacher only days being in term time and a request for these days to only happen in non-contact (holiday) days at the end of each term.

In 2025, Minister of Education, Erica Stanford, has informed schools they can have two Staff / Teacher only days to work on putting in place learning programme changes due to the updates to the English and Mathematics curriculum.

<u>The proposed 2025 dates for Staff only days are:</u> **Tuesday 4 June** (after King's Birthday Monday) and **Friday 24 October** (Friday before Labour day)

Alongside Staff / Teacher only days are **Classroom teacher non-contact** or **Classroom release time** (CRT) during the school week.

Classroom Release Time (CRT) has been available to full-time (five days) classroom teachers since Term 4 2005. Teachers who teach four and half or four days also receive a pro-rata allocation of CRT. The entitlement came from the settlement of the 2004 Primary Teachers Collective Agreement (PTCA) and has continued to be in the PTCA. CRT time started with ten hours (two school days) per term and then at the start of the 2024 year increased to fifteen hours (three school days) per term. For this current term CRT has increased to twenty hours (four days) per term. In 2025, CRT will increase to twenty five hours (five school days) per term. Mrs Patricia Lindsay is the teacher who works in classrooms while teachers have CRT time throughout the term.

Mrs Lisa Hewitt is also the Kahui ako Within school leader for our school and this role requires her to be working on Kahui ako work for two hours per week on a Thursday. Mrs Lindsay also covers this time for Mrs Hewitt.

In 2025 classroom teachers that hold management/leadership responsibilities will also have another ten hours (two school days) per term to do the work related to the management/leadership responsibility they hold.

Throughout 2024 all the staff, including teacher aides and office staff, have been to **Professional development** events with a focus on adapting learning and/or supporting neurodiverse students. These days have been led by experts including Kathryn Burkett, Neuroscience And Trauma Informed Network Aotearoa (NATINA), Resource teachers of learning and Behaviour (RTLB) and Stand Tū Māia and many other providers.

Staff Professional development in Term 4

Structured Literacy

In Term 4, Mrs Michelle Busch, Mrs Carolyn Watson and Mrs Patricia Lindsay will be learning to implement a structured literacy programme aligned with the new Ministry of Education expectations for 2025 onwards. This will mean these teachers will have three days of professional development during this term. The first day was on Wednesday 30 October. Mrs Lisa Hewitt and Ms Tracey Burgess have already completed professional development on structured literacy.

Collaborative & Proactive Solutions (CPS) = Ross Greene

Mrs Lisa Hewitt and Mrs Tania Rowse Felger are attending professional development, on Monday 4 November, led by Ross Greene, a clinical psychologist. Ross Greene's work is centered on solving the problems that cause a child's behavior, not merely on modifying the behavior. If you understand why and when a child is challenging, you can help them problem-solve in a collaborative and proactive way. Ross Greene is also known for explosive child theory. The used of the word "Explosive" is just a descriptive term for kids who become frustrated far more easily and more often, and communicate their frustration in ways that are far more extreme (screaming, swearing, spitting, hitting, kicking, biting, cutting, destroying property) than "ordinary" kids.

<u>Mathematics programmes in New Zealand Primary schools in 2025 = Maths No</u> Problem

Alongside the updating of the English curriculum with the science of learning: structured literacy, we have a New Zealand wide introduction of one of four mathematics programmes. Maths No Problem is one of the four options. Therefore we will continue with Maths No Problem for 2025.

<u>2025 - Bring Your own Chromebook - Year 5 to 8</u>

In 2025 we will be introducing for the Year 5 to 8 children "Bring your own chromebook." (BYOC). We are working with RevIT to determine the most effective chromebook specifications for the primary school setting.

- Screens should be 10" or larger and memory should a minimum built-in storage of 64GB
- Battery life is important. You should purchase devices that will not run out of battery
 halfway through the school day. Students must charge their device at home each evening.
 Look for a model that was released in the last 5 years.
- Touch screen is not needed
- Get a case and/or carry bag for it (look for shock absorbing ones)
- You don't have to buy a new device. Ex-lease and refurbished devices mean you can buy good devices and keep the price down.
- All devices should be able to connect to the school's wifi as this is built into modern devices.
- Extra advice from the Ministry of Education website: Don't buy the cheapest option at the Boxing Day sale. While it may be cheaper, it is likely not suitable for your child's learning.

Messages from the classrooms... Pūharakeknui news ...

We have been pleased to welcome Maddie, who is year 2, and Laylah into Pūharakekenui this term. It is wonderful to have new friends in our space.

Athletics had been our main focus in the afternoons, with the Year 2 tamariki showing improvement in their technique. The year 1 students have worked hard at the new skills that they have been learning.

We have also been thinking about how we are all different and how different people need different things to be successful. For example, my eyes don't work properly and I wouldn't be able to get through each day if I didn't have glasses. We have also been learning about giving compliments. Keep an eye out for a Seesaw post about your tamaiti, with all the compliments that their classmates have given to them.

Ōuruhia not Ouruhia

At the end of Term 3, the board applied to the Ministry of Education to have the macron added to the O at the beginning of the word Ouruhia. The Ministry of Education has approved the adding of the macron. At this stage this change will be an administrative change only at the Ministry of Education. Future school signage, including signage on Marshlands road, will have the name updated. Alongside this change will be future school uniform items that have the school name on them having the macron included.

Why add the macron?

When contacting Ngai Tuahuriri about local area names, we received the below information regarding the correct spelling of the name Ouruhia with the macron. The students have been learning to pronounce the name correctly, over the last few years through the singing of the school waiata. The longer sound emphasis on the beginning letter O is the same for the pronunciation of the Te reo Māori name for Christchurch - Ōtautahi.

Ōuruhia

Ouruhia

Öuruhia is a kāinga mahinga kai (food-gathering place) located near the Waimakariri River. Öuruhia takes its name from Uruhia — a son of Tūrākautahi, one of the principal Ngāi Tūāhuriri rangatira who led the Ngāi Tūhaitara migration to Canterbury and established Kaiapoi pā. During the 1879 Smith-Nairn Royal Commission of Inquiry into the Ngāi Tahu land claims, Taare Wi Teihoka and others from Ngāi Tūāhuriri recorded Ōuruhia as a kāinga mahinga kai where the wide range of foods gathered included tuna (eel), paraki (smelt), waharoa (horse mussel), inanga (whitebait), mata (juvenile whitebait), pātiki (flounder), aua (yellow-eyed mullet), panako, kōkopu (native trout), pipiki (fish sp.), pūtakitaki (paradise duck), pārera (grey duck), raipo (New Zealand scaup), tataa (brown teal), totokipio (New Zealand dabchick), tutu, pora ("Māori turnip"), aruhe (bracken fernroot) and kōrari (the flower stalk of harakeke.


