BOOK WEEK 2024


Grandparents morning and **Book character day.** Thursday 26 September - 9am to 10:45am

New Zealand Curriculum updates and implementation

Term 1, 2025: Schools and kura must teach the updated English and Te Reo Rangatira curriculum for Years 0 to 6, and Maths and pangarau for Years 0 to 8.

There will be five phases of learning which progress students' knowledge and understanding over time. These phases are Years 0-3, 4-6, 7-8, 9-10, 11-13. These will now be strengthened by a year-by-year sequence so teachers know what they need to cover in each year.



Maths Curriculum 2025 (LINK)

The new curriculum has three phases.




There are three elements in the mathematics and statistics learning area:

- Understand
- Know
- Do

Understand helps connect school maths with the wider world and identifies critical learning in maths. Understand comes alive as students engage in the practices of **Do** to learn the knowledge embedded in Know.

Know is broken down into six strands that represent the key learning in maths: number, algebra, measurement, geometry, statistics, and probability.

Do includes processes that provide ways of presenting, applying, investigating, manipulating, and connecting the mathematical knowledge in the curriculum. These processes are central to how students learn and apply maths knowledge.



A comprehensive mathematics and statistics programme has the following elements:

- 1. Positive relationships with maths
- 2. Maths mastery and a structured approach to teaching and learning
- 3. Effective use of technology
- 4. Explicit teaching

Structure for dedicated maths lessons

- A 'getting started' introduction
- Working time aim to have a variety explicit teaching and independent or guided practice and activities supporting active retrieval
- A 'connect and reflect' summary self and peer assessment reflecting on goals and identifying next steps, checking conceptual understanding, with an emphasis on procedures, vocabulary, and representations, noticing and highlighting curiosity, resilience, perseverance through challenges, and progress.

English Curriculum 2025 (Year 0-6*) (LINK)

*Draft English (Years 7 to 13) will be available in Term 4 2024.

The new English Year 0-6 curriculum has two phases.




There are three elements in the mathematics and statistics learning area:

- Understand
- Know
- Do

Understand describes the big ideas and themes that students develop over phases 1 to 5. **Know** outlines the meaningful and important content, concepts, and topics that exemplify and enrich students' understanding of the big ideas and themes.

Do describes the skills and actions that students practise, demonstrating what they know and understand.





Oral language – the focus of this strand is to teach students to communicate and interact effectively and to express themselves, building a solid foundation for collaborative learning and mutual respect.

Reading – the focus of this strand is to teach students to decode and comprehend text and instill in them an early love for reading. > Writing – the focus of this strand is to teach students to express ideas in written form that others can understand and to foster a love for writing from an early age.

The teaching of English is a comprehensive teaching and learning programme underpinned by the science of learning, explicit teaching and positive relationships with oral language, reading, and writing.


