
















FLAG FOOTBALL

As Kaimai is a SunSmart school we require students to wear hats during Terms 1 & 4. Please check that your child has either their school hat or a bucket hat in their bag.

Starting from next week those without hats will have to stay in the shade during break times.

This is an important opportunity for all students and staff to practice the life-saving action of Drop, Cover, and Hold so we are prepared for a real emergency.



Kaimai School has registered to take part in national Save Your Teddy Day, coinciding with World Restart a Heart Day, where our Year 1 - 3 students will learn how to save a life by practicing CPR on their teddy or soft toy.

The children will be participating in this fun and exciting Hato Hone St John session via a video. This is a practical activity where they will learn and practice how to respond when a person needs care in a cardiac arrest using their teddy or soft toy.

On Thursday, 16th October Children in Ruma Kereru and Ruru will need to bring their teddy or soft toy to school for Save Your Teddy Day.



Loud Shirt Day is the boldest, brightest, most feel-good day to raise awareness for kids that are deaf and have hearing loss.

We invite students to wear their loudest and brightest shirts on Friday, 17th October.

Hearing loss is often an unseen condition - raising awareness is vital to raising understanding!
