
Kia ora e te whānau, nau mai haere mai ki te pānui Wiki Tahi - welcome to Term 4 and to our first newsletter.

We trust you had an enjoyable break and were able to spend some time with your child/ren and wider whānau and friends. Unfortunately the weather wasn't too kind for chunks of it but it is spring afterall!

For the last week of Term 4 and the first week of the school holidays I was fortunate to be travelling in Japan with a group of eight students from MIS and, collectively, 60 students in total from seven intermediate schools in the Waikato. It was a great experience for our ākonga (learners) to be immersed in Japanese culture, living authentically with host families for almost two weeks. We are very grateful for this opportunity and know that many long-lasting friendships were forged, along with a myriad of special memories made. In March we look forward to hosting up to 25 students from Shibuya Makuhari Junior High School and also returning to Japan in September. I am holding a meeting with any interested students tomorrow and *expressions of interest / application forms* will be going home; a parents meeting will be held on 18th November at 5.30 p.m. in the Hall.



With less than ten weeks of the school year left I wanted to draw your attention to our Learner Profile: EMPOWERED. To ensure our tamariki (children) are set up for success we need to ensure that 'EVERY DAY COUNTS AND EVERY MINUTE MATTERS'. We are proud of the culture we aspire to achieve at MIS and work hard to enable our students to achieve personal excellence through the myriad opportunities afforded to them. As staff, we can't do it on our own. We would appreciate it if you could discuss the learner profile with your child (i.e. the skills and dispositions needed for success as both a student and citizen) and what this may look like for them.



We look forward to a great term ahead with your ongoing support ... we held an assembly on Monday reiterating and clarifying the expectations we have of our students and making it very clear that we want a positive and engaging term with everyone feeling happy and demonstrating good choices and values (including in their learning and behaviour); poor behaviour will not be tolerated! We have many privileges on the horizon including our annual Fun Day and Y. 8 Social and it would be sad to have to exclude students from these events due to poor behaviour that impacts not only themselves, but others.

As a school we work really hard to develop a positive culture for learning where everyone feels safe and valued; all tamariki are expected to demonstrate our school vision, motto, values and learner profile (essentially the Key Competencies) consistently. Any students being stood down or suspended will likely be excluded from the Fun Day or Social which we deem to be a privilege and celebration something to be earned.

As you will be aware, today was our Livestock Day, following on from Craft Day yesterday. I want to congratulate all students who got involved in these activities as they require a lot of internal commitment, perseverance and determination. Once again the Hall was decked out with amazing creativity, and the fields filled with much loved, and well cared for animals. Despite it being many moons ago for myself, I still look back on Livestock Day with fondness and can attribute many skills learnt through rearing calves as a youngster, including determination and resilience!

STRIKE Information for Communities: 23rd October = school will be CLOSED (to be confirmed closer to the time)

You may have heard that NZEI Te Riu Roa members recently voted to take strike action on 23rd October. Many of our teaching and support staff (as well as myself as principal) are NZEI Te Riu Toa members and will be joining the strike. I want you to know this decision was not made lightly.

Throughout our collective agreement negotiations (where we negotiate for improvements to our working terms and conditions) we have raised several issues that would make a big difference to support our students' learning, but we don't feel that the Government is listening to us or is understanding what schools and students really need. This includes recognising that our learners need more support, including a teacher aide for every classroom.

We're also asking the Government to value all school staff for the work they do. We want to attract and retain great people in our classrooms, rather than seeing them leave for Australia, or beyond.

A strike means a day without pay, but that is a sacrifice we are making to try and get the Government to hear us and give us what is needed to support all students.

In summary, the board, due to having insufficient staff to adequately operate the school, have made the decision that MIS will close for the strike day on 23rd October. If the strike is called off prior to the 23rd we will notify you as soon as possible.

Attendance:

Congratulations to the students who were able to attend regularly (i.e. 90%+ in Term 3) ... there were 220 (58%) of you, including 20 students who attended 100% of the time.


As you will be aware, there is a goal for 80% of all students to be attending school at least 90% of the time in New Zealand by 2030. 90% equates to having five days off per term which seems reasonable.

We started off the year doing really well, with 76% of our tamariki achieving this. Unfortunately, Term 3 saw a real tumble in statistics with only 58% of our students attending regularly, and only 80. This can be attributed mostly to some terrible viruses and illnesses doing the rounds which are unavoidable.

However, there were other factors that impacted, including students staying home because:

- it was wet, or too cold
- not wanting to do sport
- Friday/Monday
- family holidays or long weekends
- not wanting to attend school trips/activities
- the last day of term
- they didn't have any food
- their uniform was in the wash

The above reasons are categorised as unjustified ... if you need any support from us to assist your child to get to school please reach out to us; we do have spare uniform and food available for those who need assistance.




We have to report to the Ministry of Education annually on our attendance. Our goals include:

- Target # 2: Reduce unjustified attendances across the school

We currently have 2% unjustified attendance which we would like to reduce to < 1.5% by the end of Term 3

Target # 3: Reduce the rate of absences on Mondays and/or Fridays by $\geq 5\%$

As you can see from the graph below, Mondays and particularly Fridays are our days of lowest attendance for Term 3. Last year we had just under 88% attending on Fridays so Term 3 has slipped below this.



What can I do to make sure my child is going to school?

To make school a priority, there are things you can do at home, and things you can work alongside the school on:

- talk to your children about why it is important to go to school every day – ask them what they want to be in the future.
 Their education is the key to doing well in life
- be positive about school
- set good habits about going to school from day one
- prepare your children the night before for school have they done their homework, do they need to take anything along tomorrow?
- have a consistent good morning routine, so it's not too rushed and they have time to get everything they need
- don't let them have the day off just because they would rather be at home
- don't keep them at home when you know that they may be nervous about school – talk to your child and talk the school about how they are feeling
- check in regularly with your child, listen to what they are telling you or not telling you - this may make it easier to pick up on any worries they have
- keep family holidays outside of term-time, every day at school is an opportunity to build their knowledge and skills, and repetition is critical for learning especially for primary school children
- don't overload them school may be exhausting for some children so make sure they have some downtime after school to relax and have a break.



Morrinsville Intermediate school board - casual vacancy for a parent representative:

As previously advised, a casual vacancy has occurred on the school board for an elected parent representative. The board decided to fill the vacancy by selection.

As there were no requests from eligible voters to hold a by-election, the board has elected Mrs Teresa Higham by selection, with immediate effect. Special Person's Day:

Our school's annual 'Special Person's Day' is being held on Wednesday 12th November starting at 11am. Students will invite someone special in their lives to join them on this day to enjoy cultural performances by various groups within our school, a career themed activity in class with them, a shared kai and the opportunity to stay on and play games with them at lunchtime in the playground. More information will come closer to the time but for now we would love it if you could talk with your child about who they would like to invite and perhaps get them to pop the date on their calendar.



Canteen:

It has been noticed that a number of students have been bringing \$20 and sometimes \$50 notes to spend at the canteen. Unfortunately we find it difficult to give change for these denominations so ask that nothing bigger than a \$10 note is sent to school as we do not keep large quantities of cash on site.

We do have eftpos in the canteen now so students are able to bring debit/eftpos cards to school as an alternative.

Property Updates:

We were a hive of activity over the holidays with two major projects on the go:

- 1. Our classroom refurbishments which are now coming to the end of Stage Two (of three stages, due to finish at the end of Term 4).
- 2. Our newly re-clad PE shed thanks to Semmens Homes, Sylvester electrical and Kim Edgecombe Painter.
