This is in accordance with the Ministry of Health Infectious Diseases guidelines. It helps ensure that children are well enough to return to school and to minimise the spread of bugs. Survey

Kei ngaku nui, kei ngaku rahi, tēnei te reo o mihi e rere nei ki a koutou.

Te Nehenehenui is the Post Settlement Governance Entity (PSGE) for Maniapoto me ōna hapū maha. In partnership with the Ministry of Education, Te Nehenehenui will look to support the increase of ākonga Māori and whānau engagement with their schools and learning.

Purpose of the Survey

The survey aims to collect honest feedback from ākonga Māori (students), their whānau, and educators to:

- Understand how Māori students experience learning and school.
- Strengthen the place of te ao Māori in schools.
- Improve partnerships with whānau, hapū, and iwi.
- Celebrate what is working well and improve where needed.

For Whānau of Ākonga Māori

This version helps whānau share how connected they feel to the school and share their ideas and thoughts about Māori language, culture, and identity in their child's school.

Tips for Whānau:

- Answer as honestly and openly as possible.
- Think about your experiences with school events, communication, and support for your tamariki.
- If unsure about any question, leave it blank or write a comment.

General Tips for All Surveys

- Confidentiality: Individual responses will be kept private and confidential.
- Clarity: Take your time, and don't rush.
- Support: It's okay to ask for help or clarification at any time contact Kristen Pari at TNN. Next Steps After Surveys
- Responses will be collected and reviewed by the Te Hono Miro team.
- Key themes and suggestions will be shared with the schools.
- Actions will be planned with whānau, hapū, and iwi input to strengthen outcomes for ākonga Māori, their whānau and support for schools.
