Celebrating Student Progress and Achievement

Key targets have been set as part of our Strategic Planning to raise student achievement in relation to the NZ Curriculum. Following mid year assessment and reporting, students are making progress towards developing their knowledge and skills within literacy and numeracy, and other learning areas such as art, technology, PE and health.

All students are working towards achieving NZ Curriculum goals in reading using phonemic awareness and the structured literacy programme. There have been gains in student achievement however 62% are not where they need to be yet. This is similar to 2024 although we have a changing cohort of students.

All students are working hard towards achieving NZ Curriculum goals in written language to reach their age appropriate levels making gains in their learning. 27% are achieving at expected level with 73% requiring accelerated learning. There have been some quick gains which will continue to increase with structured literacy and more explicit teaching.

All students are working towards achieving NZ Curriculum goals in math, strengthening their basic facts knowledge. Maths is another area where we are working towards accelerating student achievement to support students' progress. 38% of students are achieving at their expected level with 62% not where they need to be yet.

Staff and trustees are aware of the need to progress student outcomes and build collective capacity across the school. There is a plan that identifies actions and goals to raise student achievement. We are mindful of the complex needs of our tamariki.

Our overall goal is to have all Year 8 students reach the expected level of achievement for their age by the time they leave school, which the majority of them have already achieved in reading. Other core subject areas will be achieved by most at the end of the school year.

Ministry attendance expectation has been reviewed to reflect ≥90%. Although we are somewhat behind in term 1, term 2 picked up considerably. We know that achievement data shows there is a strong link between attendance and academic progress, however we can report that our tamariki are happy at school, they enjoy coming here, and they are making good friends. Let's continue to focus on everything that strengthens and supports our vision 'Growing Your Glow - Te Whakatipu i to Uira'. Congratulations students, teachers, whanau - kia kaha!

Small Schools Cross Country

Our school continues to host the district's cross country races thanks to the community support from Christen & Katie Dimond, HTG managers and Tokikapu Marae. The small schools cross country race will be held on Wednesday 6 August, only three weeks away. The briefing begins at 10.40am with the first race starting at 11.00am, being the Years 0-2 girls. All students from Years 0 to 8 will participate and we will require assistance with transport to the venue. To run a very successful day we need marshals, and helpers on the food stall. A pink note will be sent home for parents and caregivers very soon, please look out for this. Children will continue to train at school, on the domain, and at home in their own time.
