NZEI Te Riu Roa members are taking industrial action because the Government has failed to provide offers in negotiations that will ensure educators get the resources you need to support tamariki or the pay that will attract and keep quality professionals in our worksites.

We will be joined by nurses, senior doctors and dentists, PPTA members and Allied Health staff.

The bulk of our Staff are members of NZEI. The NZEI members will be attending gatherings on this day so there will not be enough staff at school to safely manage the students therefore the school will be closed. On Thursday 23rd October school will be closed unless before this time negotiations have progressed. We will keep you informed if this plan changes.

This piece of information is from another schools newsletter and I believe pertinent to everyone with young children accessing online platforms. Kathryn Berkette presented at a teachers conference locally and her information is excellent. I encourage you to listen to any of her presentations or podcasts.

Should my child be playing Roblox?

This question and others like it have been mentioned by teachers and parents alike in the staffroom and around school lately.

One key factor that I would suggest is, if you do have children that are playing online games - primary school aged children should 100% only be playing online games with other people they know in real life. Games like Roblox have public versions and levels with chatrooms that any user in the game can chat inside of - these are a hunting ground for child predators. They also have private versions and levels that can be set up and only shared to real life friends so that they can play and chat together. Ensuring this is the case for your children is something I can not recommend strongly enough.

On the public/private settings - most social media, which the terms and conditions say are for 13+ but we know that many younger children do create accounts, can be set up as private or public as you will know from your own experience. What you may not know is that when TikTok first came out all accounts defaulted to 'public'. Nowadays that is the case for users 16 and over - the loophole here is that an under 13 year old creating their own TikTok account may put in a false birthday that sets them up with an over 16 year old automatically public account. Following TikTok's lead, most other social media platforms now have similar settings.

Kathryn Berkett, is a neuroscientist that spoke at the NZSBA conference and gave loads of great advice in this space. One of her key tips is the difference between young people watching TV vs being on a small device like a phone or an iPad.

- When watching TV, children are sometimes still moving their body, they can still be quite aware of the other people in the room and what they are saying or doing.
- Compared to when using a handheld device they are much more stagnant and locked into that screen and more oblivious to the world around them.

The importance Kathryn Berkett pushes around this is a missing link of social skills. Young people's brains are constantly scanning their environments and picking up on how others around them are interacting. "Oh my mum said excuse me to that man as she walked past him in the supermarket, that must be the polite way to do that." "She said hello and smiled to that lady I have seen walking around our area, she must be a safe person". When locked into a handheld device, none of these important occurrences are being picked up by the child's brain and stored away for future real life scenarios and social interactions. 
