#### Reporting: Feedback on 'Open Classrooms'

This term I had sent a feedback form out to our school families to gain feedback from the parent community regarding the 'Open Classroom' day we had in term 3, the same day as Showcase. Thank you very much to the 27 responses I had (would have liked a few more). It has given the staff and I valuable information to plan our assessment schedule for 2026.

Many said they felt their child was relaxed with the informal setting and 82% said the students were well prepared to share their learning and general classroom happenings. 59 % preferred the Open Classroom and 41 % liked the student-led conferences. Interestingly a small group in hindsight regretted not making a follow up appointment with the teacher if they did not attend. There were many that expressed they like the option of both.

It is noted that when communicating with the community we expressed that people were more than welcome to make an appointment if they felt they would like a 1-1 time with the teacher or they could not make it on the day. Across the whole school this was only done by one family.

Currently the teachers are being released to carry out assessment and write reports. There has been PAT testing for Yr.4 -Yr 8. We are very lucky to have great people we can call on to step into the classrooms across the school to release teachers. This week we have had Gemma Hamilton and Pip Francis in the school. We very much appreciate their skill and ease with the way they can step into any level of teaching and provide a stimulating day of learning for our kids.

At the end of this year you will receive a written report from the class teacher and information for 2026.

## Inspiring Futures

Whitestone Kāhui Ako's Across School Leaders Steve, Tiffany and Dana invited Duntroon Year 8 students to an Inspiring the Future Actearoa event last week. It was all about opening young people's eyes to new careers and different pathways to success, challenging gender stereotypes and traditional ideas about education – and highlighting all the awesome opportunities available in Waitaki! This year's role models had careers ranging from Al engineering and building to farming, firefighting, paramedicine, environmental advisory, forestry, surveying, videography, content creation and career guidance.

### Year 8 Career day at St Josephs

The day started out with all of the Year 8s from a lot of different schools gathering in the St Josephs School hall, which had 11 people sitting up the front. We were all given a sheet of paper and were given the task of guessing what the people's jobs were. We would ask questions like: Do you work with animals? Or does your job involve heavy machinery? To narrow it down. The big reveal came when the people went out the back and changed into their work clothes. We then shared our guesses with them. Some of the jobs were easy to guess such as the firefighter, but others like the careers coach and environmental supervisor were more challenging!

We then had a break for lunch where we got to meet a lot of different people from different schools. After that we split into groups and got to meet the careers people and ask them questions. I found the helicopter paramedic very interesting as he gets to fly in the helicopter and he gets to work in a variety of different places. No two days are the same!

Overall, the day was really fun and interesting as we got to learn about a wide range of different jobs and career paths that will be helpful in the future. We also got to connect with Year 8s from other schools.

#### Aspiring Futures day

The day started with a quiet car ride to St Joseph's primary school, the silence quickly replaced by the lively and excited chatter of roughly 115 students as we entered the vast room. As we made our way to our seats, we waved and eyed other students from the various schools, whom we knew from our previous year 8 days and rural school activities. We took to our seats and waited patiently for our career examples to arrive. Rebbeca Ryan approached the lecturn and gave us a brilliant speech about her life story and her path to becoming Deputy Mayor of Waitaki. The career examples rolled in and took a seat at the front of the bustling hall and the event got underway. We started off with asking 20 questions each of which the 12 career examples had to answer either Yes, No, Maybe or Sometimes. This therefore narrows down the big question of; WHAT ARE THE CAREERS OF THESE 12 PEOPLE WHO ARE SITTING IN FRONT OF US?? After the 20 questions were asked by various students we got sent off into 11 different groups for 10 minutes to discuss and share the possibilities on what careers the examples who are sitting in front of us may occupy. The 12 examples then entered the room dressed in their uniforms or what they would wear on a regular day at work. Each group then took turns at standing upfront and sharing with the rest of what we thought each of the 12 jobs were. We took a lunch break and then entered the hall once more to get back into our groups. Once all groups were sorted we went around each of the careers and spent 10 minutes at each, asking questions such as; How long did you study for?What is the hardest part of your job?,or What is the best bit of your career? This therefore gave us further insight to the extent of their jobs and chances to discover new ones that we'd never heard of before.

My personal interest was probably the forestry engineer as it was a different view into agriculture that I hadn't considered before. She told us that, even though she was only in her first year she was already managing 2 harvest crew many of which were older than her and she was able to do this as she completed 3 years of university. It was interesting to learn that there are many different parts of forestry from engineering to science and many in between.

That's why it's my favourite because it caught my interest and I wanted to learn more about it. It is also my favorite because it was interesting to see the drones that she used and the actual 3d print of the mine that she works at, we even got to hold the drone ourselves.

#### Safety

- Key holders are responsible for ALL people they admit to the pool.

- Children under the age of 16 must be actively supervised by a person 18 yrs or older.
- Due to health and hygiene reasons all babies/toddlers not yet toilet trained must wear swim pants such as Huggies "Little Swimmers" (not underwear) whilst swimming.
- No jumping, bombing or diving into the pool.

#### Pool

- Opening hours: 6am-9pm (During school terms the pool is closed to the public 9am-3pm)
- It's essential that you sign the pool register when you enter and leave the complex.
- Ensure the cover is placed back over the pool and the gate is locked when leaving.
- Please leave the complex in a tidy state and remove your own rubbish.
- The swimming pool complex is smoke-free at all times.


