Welcome to Week 9 of Term 3. We are finally starting to see a bit more sunshine, as well as seeing the days starting to stretch out a little longer. It's great to be able to get home and start to spend more time outdoors in the evening. Spring is here and it was really noticeable on Friday when a group of kaitiaki travelled out

home to assist with some planting as part of the Trees for Survival programme. I have been working on our creek area which was originally surrounded by blackberry and weeds, and had been grazed by the local farmer. The creek had suffered erosion from cattle, and was completely overgrown with weeds. Around 400+ plants were planted on Friday, adding to the other natives that have been planted over the past ten years. A combination of grasses, harakeke and cabbage trees were planted, as well as some karamu and taraire seedlings. Two groups of tamariki travelled out with Whaea Sierra, joined by Whaea Maria and Whaea Ngaio, to assist with the supervision and planting.





Fantastic to see these kaitiaki developing life long skills in protecting and planting for our environment and for future generations. After a session of planting, tamariki had some home made lemonade and baking, before heading down to hang out with the dog, chooks and then to feed the pet eels. Our tamariki were superstars, getting lots of natives planted and helping to prevent further creek erosion. Our next lot of seedlings will be delivered next term at school, ready to raise for another community planting. A big thank you to Kate from Trees for Survival and all of our staff and tamariki for a fantastic day!!!!

Tomorrow I will join our Year 6 students as they travel for an overnight stay at the Tangihua Ranges Lodge. Around 40+ students will be heading south with our staff and a group of parents in the morning, returning to school on Wednesday afternoon. Great to see our tamariki getting out into our beautiful environment and making the most of these activities. Looking forward to a couple of wonderful days away. Have a great week ahead whanau!


### **SIGN OUT PROCEDURE**

We're excited to let you know that Whau Valley School is moving into the digital age! Coming soon, when you collect your tamariki early (for an appointment or if they are unwell), you'll simply use the tablet at the office to sign them out.

The tablet will print a slip with your child's name on it – take this to the teacher, just like the old green slips to show you have signed your tamariki out at the office. If you're collecting more than one child, you'll need to sign out each child and take a

slip for each.

### **HEAD LICE (NITS / KUTUS)**

- <u>FREE</u> headlice shampoo and nit combs available through the school office.
- Treat hair every 7-10 days AND use nit comb every 2-3 days on damp hair with conditioner until they are gone.
- Brush hair every day, this can help kill or injure head lice to stop them from laying more eggs.
- Don't share brushes, combs or hair accessories.
- Tie long hair in a ponytail, bun or braid.
- TIP: Straightening hair after treatment can help kill any missed eggs.
- You DO NOT need to hot wash bedding & toys etc.
