We are seeing some good attendance figures and a number of student's attendance rates improving significantly, but are also aware that weather and health have had an impact recently. **Our biggest concern is the number of students that are still being marked as truant, with no communication from whanau.** We ask that school is contacted when your child is away, or respond to the text messages when these are sent out.

The Skool Loop app on your phone is also an easy way to quickly let us know if tamariki are away. We would love to see our attendance rates back in the 90% range daily. We are also seeing a continued trend of Monday's and Friday's as our lowest attendance days. As a school we see the difference regular attendance makes for our tamariki, particularly in being settled, making good

progress in learning and having strong and positive relationships with their peers.



This continues to be popular each morning with around 60 tamariki participating daily. They enjoy toast with spreads, weetbix, fruit salad and hot milo each morning. We have been very fortunate to have had Dan Weaver



from Subway supporting this last term, generously sponsoring the fruit salad, Margarine, Jam and Milo. This has been greatly appreciated by everyone. Whaea Maria has also been busy stewing surplus apples over the holiday break with our tamariki having stewed apples as an option also. Our tamariki are extremely lucky to have this available each day, and to be able to go to class with a full puku.


