Reporting and the new Curriculum

The New Zealand Ministry of Education is currently undertaking a refresh of the national curriculum to ensure it is relevant, fit for purpose, and prepares young people for their future. Here are key things you need to know about these changes:

This will be ongoing for many years - it will continue to evolve. Teacher development will also take place as part of the change process. Teachers are working hard incorporating these changes, and as always the needs and interests of your child are at the heart of what they do in classrooms.

The curriculum is being updated in stages, with new content for English (Years 0-6) and Mathematics and Statistics (Years 0-8) currently available. Schools have until the beginning of 2027 to fully implement the refreshed national curriculum.

For mathematics, the content expected to be taught at each year level has been revised and designed to be internationally comparable.

eg: Year 3 students need to identify, read, write, compare and order numbers to 1,000

Year 4 students need to identify, read, write, compare and order numbers to 10,000

Year 5 students to 100,000

Year 6 students to 1,000,000

Please note: Due to these higher benchmarks in the revised Mathematics and English curriculum, It is highly probable that your child's initial progress and achievement levels might appear lower than what they have previously achieved. This is because the expectations for what they need to know at each age have increased. For example, your child who may have been *at* or *above* in regards to the previous curriculum levels may not be *working towards*.

There will continue to be twice yearly reports on your child's progress in relation to these new learning objectives. Mid year reporting is interim until there is more understanding of the curriculum and assessment tools, as the government is still looking to release new information and resources

Attendance

As of 2025, the school must record all absences, along with the reason for the absence by 9 o'clock each day. This information will be monitored and gathered by the Ministry of Education at 6pm each night. If no reason is given for your child / children's absence, then we have no choice but to mark them down as truant.

Updated information

Please ensure that you have all your contact details up to date with school. We prefer to send information electronically, so an updated email is always appreciated. Please email Susan office@knapdale.school.nz if you need to update your information.

Accounts

Please remember these need to be paid. The funds have already gone out of the school accounts. If you can only pay a small amount each week/month, that's great. A small amount goes a long way. If you need to know the balance of any existing account, please contact Susan - office@knapdale.school.nz or ring the school on 208 9473.

Sickness

If your child / children display any symptoms of being ill, can you please keep them at home. If your child displays any symptoms on arriving at school, we will ring and ask for them to be picked up.

In the past we have had to bear the brunt from some unhappy parents. However, if a large proportion of my staff become ill, the only recourse open to me is to close the school.

Currently it is exceptionally hard to find relievers. We book weeks ahead for relievers to come to our school so ringing around the night before is definitely not an option.

So your vigilance in regards to this matter would be much appreciated.
