Principal's Message

Last week our school went on a very special trip to visit two beautiful churches in Wellington: St Mary of the Angels and the Sacred Heart Cathedral. For many of us, this was the first time stepping inside a Catholic church and experiencing Mass in such a special place. Usually, we have our school Masses in the hall, so this was a new experience.

We learned many things you can only discover in a church. We found out why we genuflect when there is a tabernacle, and why we bow to the altar if there isn't one. We also learned about the holy water font at the door (where we bless ourselves when we enter) and the baptismal font (where baptisms take place).

It was exciting to hear the huge pipe organ play at St Mary of the Angels — the sound filled the whole church! We also explored the statues of Mary, Jesus, and the saints, looked at the Stations of the Cross, and lit candles as a way of offering prayers.

A special thank you to Simone, our DRS, for her hard work in organising this trip for the whole school. We are also grateful to the Holy Trinity Parish, who kindly subsidised the cost of the buses, and to our children, whose excellent behaviour was commended by the local priests.

What a wonderful whole school pilgrimage we had last week to visit St Mary of the Angels and Sacred Heart Cathedral!

The students were in awe of the majesty and beauty of St Mary of the Angels, which was the first church built in Wellington in 1843. Akonga were able to recognise many of the Gospel stories and saints in the stunning stained glass windows. Encountering the life-sized statues of Mary, Jesus and Joseph was a memorable experience for the children. We were even treated to a organ concert.

The highlight of St Mary of the Angels is seeing the unique artwork of the Māori Mary "Ko Hāta Maria, te Matua Wahine o te Atua, Holy Mary, Mother of God" by Damien Walker.

Our next stop was the Metropolitan Cathedral of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and of Saint Mary His Mother. There we heard about the interesting history and numerous rebuilds. We learned good catholic practices like genuflecting, bowing and blessing ourselves with holy water. It was a moving experience to be able to celebrate mass with the community.











This last part of the term, we have all loved exploring language and vocabulary through poetry.
