CLASSROOM NEWS:

RUMA KĀKANO

This week we had a wonderful time celebrating International Literacy Day! We joined the whole school for a scavenger hunt around the grounds where we solved different literacy questions, it was so much fun working together.

We also had a special visit from Bob Bickerton, who shared his taonga pūoro (traditional Māori instruments). The tamariki were fascinated by the unique sounds, and some even had a go at recreating his special instruments afterwards with classroom resources

In maths, we've started our geometry unit, learning all about the features and names of 2D shapes. The children have been very engaged and excited to explore shapes around them.

Our paper mache solar system is finally ready for painting — the planets are really coming to life! We also began our calendar art this week, and they are already looking bright, colourful, and creative.

It has been a busy and exciting week of learning in Kākano!

















RUMA TUPU

This week in Tupu we have been busy with lots of exciting learning. In maths, we have started exploring financial literacy. The children have been learning to recognise and order money, as well as how to count different sets of coins. During Tūhura time, we continued working on our solar system models. After four layers of paper mache, the children were thrilled to finally start painting them today!

We also had a very special visit from Bob Bickerton, who shared his collection of taonga pūoro (traditional Māori instruments). The children loved hearing the unique sounds he created and enjoyed the fascinating stories he told about each instrument.

To celebrate International Literacy Day on Monday, we joined in a school-wide scavenger hunt. Working in teams with children from different classes, we raced to answer questions and had lots of fun celebrating literacy.

We are looking forward to a busy last week of term and are especially excited for our Space Day next Friday!

CLASSROOM NEWS:

RUMA MĀHURI

This week in Māhuri we have been constructing drafts for our narrative writing pieces. Our focus has been on how we can engage the reader by adding rhetorical questions and varying our sentence lengths to create impact. The pieces are looking fantastic, and we hope to have them finished by the end of the term.

On Monday we loved challenging ourselves in a whole school Literacy Hunt for International Literacy Day!

We are nearly finished our Chapter Chat novel The Boy at the Back of the Class and have really enjoyed the thoughtful discussions it has sparked around the topic of refugees.

For calendar art, we have had fun experimenting with a science-inspired background using bubbles! After creating our colourful backgrounds, we will be adding a photo and a bubble that shows what is important to us.

In numeracy, we have been working on subtraction with numbers ranging from 100 to 100,000. It has been incredible to see the range of strategies being used and how quickly these are being picked up.

Our novel study group has been working hard on Charlotte's Web and are already coming up with movie snack ideas for when we watch the film!

To Government: Back education that works for all tamariki

What we are asking:

As educators, whānau and community, we are calling on the Government to back our future. This means:

Tamariki need a teacher aide in every classroom

Fund a teacher aide in every class in Budget 2026.

Value educators fairly and ensure their work is secure

Attract – and retain – the best people to educate our tamariki, by delivering fair pay and secure work to all educators – and restoring pay equity.

Uphold te Tiriti o Waitangi in education

Protect te reo Māori as a taonga for our tamariki by reinstating funding for te reo Māori learning for education professionals.

Defend quality early childhood education

Make early childhood education accessible, affordable, culturally appropriate and high quality for all tamariki, by retaining 100% qualified teachers and pay parity, and by improving teacher: child ratios.

Why we are asking for this:

All tamariki deserve an education where they can learn, feel included and access learning support when they need it. However, the Government is taking public education in the wrong direction and tamariki are being left behind.

Schools, kindergartens, and early childhood centres have faced cuts to school lunches, te reo Māori programmes, beginning teacher pay, and literacy and te reo jobs. Some schools have to fundraise to help pay for teacher aides, whose support in the classroom is invaluable for all students. Many tamariki sit on learning support waitlists for months due to inadequate learning support staffing.

Attacks on quality early childhood education and scrapping of pay equity claims for our lowest paid in education make it clear the Government does not value the work of education professionals nor our children's learning.

Primary and early childhood education teachers, learning support workers, principals and support staff, kohanga reo, wharekura and whānau are coming together to seek a new dawn in education.
