Kia ora parents, whānau and carers

Welcome back everyone! This week I would also like to welcome Tanrake, Kenneth, Bostyn, Briana, Ahan and Aadrik and their families to our Hay Park School whānau.

A huge thanks to our talented artists and their teachers for creating the stunning artwork that was on display in the Mt Roskill Art Showcase. A special thanks to Ms Guthrie for all her mahi. We visited it as a school last Thursday. Hopefully some of you went along as a family over the weekend. Check out the photos in this newsletter.

Last week you received the letter from your child's teacher outlining the main learning topics for this term. We are continuing our construct of Connections / Hononga and the key understanding is 'learning about ourselves and others helps us understand and connect to others in the world'. This term we also have Cook Islands Language Week (3-9 August), Tonga Language Week (17-23 August), Te Wiki o te Reo Māori (15-21 September), Chinese Language Week (31 August to 6 September) and, on the last Thursday of the term, our Celebration of Learning assembly. Remember to also check the calendar in this newsletter to see if your child's class is hosting an assembly this term.

As I said in the last newsletter, the date for the Hay Park School Board elections is 10 September 2025. An information pack with a letter, a pamphlet outlining what a school board does and a nomination form was sent home with children last week. If you didn't receive it or would like another one, please either collect one from the school office or let the office know (and one will be sent home for you). If you decide you would like to be on the board, you can nominate yourself or another member of our school community can nominate you. Nominations close at 12pm on Wednesday 6 August, so we need completed nomination forms returned to the office by then. Currently the board meets at 5pm on a Thursday, but that can change, depending on days and times board members are able to attend. So, if you want to be on the school board but Thursdays don't work for you, still complete a nomination form and send it in to the office.

The school board sets the strategic direction of the school and monitors our progress. You don't need any special qualifications or experience, just be interested in our tamariki and our school. All you need to do is read the information for each hui, ask questions (if you have any) and make decisions about where we are heading as a school. The school board meets twice a term, so there are only eight hui each year. The next board hui is 5pm on Thursday 31st July. Below are a couple more key areas of focus that are shaping New Zealand's approach to teaching and learning. The government has announced changes to assessment and the introduction of financial literacy. The integration of digital technologies also continues to be a key focus. We recognise the importance of equipping our tamariki with the skills and knowledge to navigate the digital world safely and effectively. Our teachers are continually exploring innovative ways to use technology to enhance learning, foster creativity and develop digital literacy. This includes not just using devices, but also understanding concepts like digital citizenship and online safety, part of our Cybersmart curriculum.

There is also a continued emphasis on wellbeing in education across the country. We understand that a child's emotional, social and physical wellbeing is fundamental to their learning and overall development. We continue to prioritise initiatives, especially the Mitey approach, that promote positive mental health, resilience and respectful relationships within our school community. This includes our dedicated pastoral care Hay Park Way team.

A couple of key changes in education from the budget are an increase in funding for learning support and disestablishing Kāhui Ako. We look forward to seeing how the increase in funding for learning support will assist our tamariki. For the last eight years we've been very lucky to be part of the Lynfield Kāhui Ako, which has been successful. Unfortunately not all Kāhui Ako around the country have worked as well as ours.

We were excited to be a part of the second annual Mount Roskill Student Art Showcase — a vibrant celebration of creativity, imagination and local talent!




This is Alaina's story.
