
TE RITO HUB



HARAKEKE HUB Shannon School Te Kura o Hanana

Tēnā koutou e te whanau, he mihi mahana ki a koutou katoa.

It has been an action-packed term across the Harakeke Hub over the past 10 weeks. Our tamariki have adapted well to the changes and are experiencing success in their learning. Our teachers have been participating in professional learning across the board, which is proving valuable in our day-to-day teaching and learning.

We were excited to meet with our whānau at 3-way conferences at the beginning of the term. Thank you all for taking the time to meet with us to talk about your child and their learning. Through our structured literacy programme, our tamariki have been able to connect their learning between reading, writing, and spelling. This has helped them to become more confident when applying their skills to other areas of the curriculum.

We continue to work on strengthening our number knowledge in maths and have been learning about measurement. Some of the tuakana had the task of measuring out the playgrounds for the new bark, using what they had learned in a real-life context. In inquiry, we have been experimenting in the realm of flexi-physics. The tuakana were learning about energy and how it is the force that allows things to go, move, and happen. We experimented with and discussed different forms of energy, including gravitational, kinetic, stored, and potential. The teina have been learning all about their bones, heart, and lungs. We have had the opportunity to explore some pretty cool equipment through the House of Science kits, including being able to see the heart actually working, inside our bodies!

Daffodil Day provided us the opportunity to dress up in yellow and raise awareness of this awesome charity. Our Year 8 learners have been participating in Mahi Toi this term with Pa Te Meera and have been learning new skills and knowledge. We always look forward to Sharon bringing her reading therapy dog, Oslo. The tamariki like to grab a book and read alongside Oslo. Cross Country has been our main sport this term. The tamariki did us proud not only at our school event but also at the inter-school Cross Country at Coley St School. We came away with some top three placings, ka mau te wehi! On Tuesday afternoons, we have been developing our ball-handling skills and focusing on what it means to be a good team player.

Looking forward, we are gearing up for our Year 6-8 camp at El Rancho in Waikanae. This is being held in week 2 of next term. We also have our end-of-the-year school production, which we are already working on. We look forward to seeing you in and around the kura throughout term four. Forbes and her team. A further highlight was the opportunity to formally welcome one of our new tamariki and his whānau onto the marae. Finally, we are ending the term on a high note with the heartfelt kapa haka performance by the tuakana. Their passion and determination shone through as they came together to deliver a performance they can be proud of.
