School Reporting

We will be sending out your child's mid year report shortly and end of year report in December, which meets the criteria for reporting following Ministry of Education regulatory requirements. In addition, we will be holding Student Led Conferences early in term 3, more to follow shortly. The written report component will change over time, once the refreshed curriculum has transitioned from draft to full implementation. Consultation at a later point will be seeked from the school community regarding reporting and also to review our school/home communication procedures.

Reporting guidance

Quality assessment and reporting involves:

- combining information from observations, classroom tasks and data from assessment tools to give a well-rounded understanding of a student's abilities.
- continuously collecting and analysing data and information throughout the year to monitor and support a student's progress.
- providing timely and clear information to parents, whanau and caregivers.

The regulatory requirements to report to parents and whanau have not changed.

At least twice a year, schools and kura are required to report to students, their parents, and their whānau in plain language on the student's progress and achievement across the curriculum and in literacy and mathematics.

School Board elections

A reminder that our **School Board Elections will be held on 10 September**. The School board is one of many opportunities for parents and caregivers to contribute to our school's direction and help create the best possible environment for our Tamariki. Anyone can be a board member*. Key roles within the board include:

- Presiding member (Chair): Leads board meetings and works closely with the principal to ensure strong communication between governance & management.
- Finance rep: Oversees financial planning, budgeting and ensures School resources are used effectively.
- Staff rep: Elected by staff this role is a full board member involved in all decision making (not a staff advocate)
- Property rep: Supports decision-making on school buildings and grounds
- Health & safety: Ensures our environment, policies and processes are safe and supportive for students and staff.
- Human resources: Helps guide staff-related matters and supports a positive working environment.

If you're curious about how the board works or what's involved, we warmly invite you to ask questions of existing board members and attend an upcoming board meeting to see the mahi in action. It's a great way to get a feel for the commitment and the nature of the role to gauge whether it is the right fit for you.


