Apologies for not getting a newsletter out to you last week.



I have just returned from a trip to Northland where I spent some quality time with principals from around the Motu/country to learn about the significance of Waitangi and Hokianga to Te Ao Māori, and its relevance for our tamariki and our schools. I had no idea about the significance of the Hokianga Harbour to Te Ao Māori – it's a pretty important place! This was the place where Kupe first entered/came into Aotearoa and his wife cried out, "he ao, he ao," meaning "a cloud, a cloud". Thus naming the land Aotearoa. The carvings at Manea Tapuwae ā Nuku were spectacular. They all had huge meaning behind them and traced back to their ancestors.



Waitangi has always been a special place to me, but I felt especially honoured that we were welcomed by one of the local hapu of Ngāpuhi – a very spiritual moment.

I know we have whanau who hark back to this region – you are certainly from one of the most beautiful places in the country.



Kaupapa mō te wiki/Value for the week:

Our values for this week are all of them – Akohia/Learning – "Doing your Best in the Test." It's assessment week this week and next week. We have got loads of assessments happening so we can find out how much movement your children have made in reading, writing, and math. To do our best in the test we need to dig deep and persevere, make links to our prior learning, and be able to concentrate for as long as we need to.

Diwali news:

Instead of Halloween this year, we are going to celebrate Diwali which is the Festival of Lights. Diwali (pronounced "Divali") is one of the major religious festivals in Hinduism, Jainism, and Sikhism. The name is derived from the Sanskrit term dipavali, meaning "row of lights." The festival generally symbolizes the victory of light over darkness.



This Friday 1st November, your child will have a choice of a variety of fun Diwali themed activities to choose from, facilitated by both parents and teachers.

- Entry in to and from School: Mornings drop your child off at the front gate or the back. If you are running late, please drop at the office thank you.
- <u>School Gates:</u> A reminder to everyone to please be respectful of our school gate closures. Front gates are closed from 9.30am until 2pm, then again from 2.50-3.10pm. Back gates are closed from 9am-2.55pm. Please do not ask our staff to open the gates for you during this time.
- Breakfast Club: Runs 5 days per week from 8 9.30am. We are always in need of volunteers for Breakfast Club please. If you would like to volunteer for this job, please advise Roseanne or Rachel at the office. Thank you.
- Lunches in Schools: We provide lunches each day. The kai will be offered to every child. All children are expected to at least try the kai.

Stopping & parking near a school OOL PAT

Everyone is only here for "a minute or two", but where and how you stop or park matters.

Stopping on broken yellow lines, across a driveway, on a bus stop, and double parking are illegal and risky maneuvers. They endanger children and other pedestrians, and you may get fined if you choose to:

Stop or park on broken yellow lines	\$100
Double park	\$100
Stop or park in front of or within 1 metre of a vehicle entrance or driveway	\$70
Stop or park on the footpath	
Stop or park on or near a pedestrian crossing	\$100
Stop or park in a way that is inconsiderate to other road users, including pedestrians	\$100
Stop or park in an area reserved for disabled persons	\$750

Please put children's safety first at <u>all</u> times.
