Property Update

Things have been a little quieter this year on the property front. 2023 saw the Ministry of Education come in to carry out assessments on our buildings to develop a report and identify the next projects of work for the next 10 years. Our first 5 year property project will see the undercover walkway re-roofed, new screws on the staffroom roof replaced and rot on the back wall of the Kowhai class. Well that is the hope anyway.

As you may have been aware, last year we experienced some challenges with our septic system, investigations found that the soak beds

have come to the end of their life. The Ministry has approved extra funding over and above our 10 year property funds. I will keep you in the loop around these projects and their start dates.

Lastly, over the last three weeks our school pool has undergone some much needed maintenance and TLC. The last time our pool area had an overhaul was back in 2011. This project has been made possible with funding from the Lottery Grants Board.

I would like to thank our whanau who have supported us to ensure we can get the pool up and running.

<u>Keeping ourselves safe</u>

Kowhai class has been looking at how we can keep ourselves safe in a variety of situations. Firstly, we focused on "being around water" as it is coming to that time of year where the tamariki spend a lot of time in and around water. The children had great knowledge on what we needed to do at the beach, river and the swimming pool. The most important thing was to have an adult there at all times and actively supervising. 

Kowhai class outing

The Kowhai class had a town day and visited Puke Ariki Museum. There, they participated in the "Sea Change" education programme. They learned about Taranaki's marine reserves and the special sponges and sea life that live there. After that we went to Kidz Korner indoor play area where the kids bounced and played until they were worn out. They had a great day.



We also had a school-based activity day, where the children came up with ideas of things they would like to do to celebrate their learning and have fun together. One theme that has been threaded throughout our school year, is our Class Garden. As part of our earlier learning about Puanga, we planned and planted out what we wanted to grow. Now, as we come closer to the end of term, many of our crops are ready to harvest, so we used these to make a shared Munch and Crunch for our Fun Day. The tamariki showed kia maia - courage by touching, smelling and tasting a variety of different ingredients, from cauliflower to cannellini beans, garlic to cinnamon, and had a great time making cauliflower dip, and carrot cake bliss balls, which they eagerly shared and ate together on our fun day. We also had celery and lettuce leaves from our garden as part of our snack, which the children enjoyed harvesting, preparing and eating. The children showed a lot of pride and eagerness to taste what they had grown and made.







Our fun day kicked off with Coach Mike coming out to run two sessions with Kowai Class. The children really enjoyed using the different equipment, demonstrating their awesome P.E skills, and trying to beat Coach Mike in the range of activities and games he offered!

After morning tea it was activities time! Tamariki had expressed interest in trying some building, creating and painting, so that was what we did! Keeping with our garden theme, the children had a chance to work with cement, making their own mosaic tile from polished stones and beads we had collected. They also took part in a free painting session where they could use the paints and tools in their own way. Lastly it was time to build the children used saws, hammers and nails, along with a variety of collected materials, to create three mini-scarecrows for our class gardens. Earlier in the year the children had noticed our plants getting eaten by the birds, so this was our chance to remedy the problem! Next time you're going past, stop in to school and check them out - the children have done a fantastic job, and they have already become a much-loved addition to our Kowhai family!

In the afternoon it was waterslide time! Kowhai Class demonstrated once again their courage and sense of adventure, as they not only braved the cold water from the hose, but showed some awesome moves on the slide! A free -play session indoors to warm up, using all our favourite toys from the year, was how we finished the day. A lot of fun was had by all, and it was great to see the children trying new things, working well together and enjoying themselves!




Matai Class

How To create your own Fantasy Map

Materials:

- 1. A piece of A3 Card
- 2. A grey led pencil
- 3. 2-3 Tea bags
- 4. A small bowl
- 5. Artline pen
- 6. Jug
- 7. Rice
 8. Dute
- 8. Ruler (optional)
- 9. News paper
 10. Desirable paper
- 10. Paintbrush

Steps:

Lets Start crafting!

1. Grab your piece of A3 Card. If you would like a grid map (optional) grab your ruler, pencil and ruler too.

Rule 3cm by 3cm squares until you map is filled with cubes.

 Draw a compass in the left or right top corner (search up a compass on google for reference).
 Pour your rice onto the paper. Shape your islands.

Trace the rice with your pencil. Make sure you get every little detail.

6. Go over the pencil with an artline pen.

7. Make the tea. Boil your jug. Put teabags in a bowl. Pour the boiling water into the bowl.

8. Once the tea has cooled, put a newspaper under your card and apply the tea inside of the islands. Let it dry.

Tainui Pet Day

On the 23rd of October my little brother and I went to the Tainui pet day. We had to get up early in the morning to get the calves Stormy and Mocca onto the trailer.

On Friday the 10th of November, Rimu class went on a curious minds trip. First, we went to the Mount messenger bypass to talk about eco sourcing. They told us what they are doing and why. Then we had some crackers, yoghurt, a nut bar and some water for morning tea.

After that we went down to their riparian site and talked about the different types of riparian plants and why they put fences around the manga (stream). We saw harakeke, kanuka and different types of grasses surrounding their manga.

Then we headed off to Greg's farm to look at the waterways to test the ph, temperature, flow and water clarity. At the first stream the pH was 6.5. This was good, as neutral is 7. The clarity was 100 and the temperature was 13 degrees. We could not do the flow test, because there was moss on the top of the water and it wasn't flowing.

Next, we headed back to the sheds and had domino's pizza, tropical juice and cookies. Once everyone was finished we walked over to the next stream. We thought that the temperature might have been higher, because there were less riparian plants. However, the temperature was 13.5 degrees. We believe it was the same temperature, because this manga was fast flowing and had riparian plants planted upstream. The pH was the same at 6.5, and the clarity was 80. We then put down a 10 meter rope to test the flow along the manga. We dropped the ball to see how fast it would flow. However, there was too much grass and shrubs over the stream so the ball kept getting stuck, so we couldn't do the test.

Next year Rimu, will continue to explore nga manga and develop our knowledge of ecosourcing.







On the 18th of November we had the Mimi school gala. The Rimu class had a stall at the Gala. We sold Paper Christmas Trees, Christmas Cards and Piñatas made by the Rimu class. Jamie brought some pots that he had spray painted different colours. He brought cuttings to school of his succulents to put into the pots. There were four different types of succulent plants, and they were different shapes and sizes.

We had the christmas cards priced at 50c, the pinatas were priced at \$10 and the plants were \$2-\$3 a pot. Altogether, our stall made close to \$170.

We had a class roster, but on the day we just joined the stall when we wanted to. We en-

joyed being on the stall and talking to customers and the community.

Most of the Rimu class went on the magic carpet ride and were covered in mud and some brown and black cow poo. It was all over their clothes and in their mouth! The day was Awesome.
