## Greetings from the Principal

Ata marie, Guten tag, Bonjour

What another glorious week we have had. I was envious of Mrs Taylor, Mrs Bradshaw and the Room 7 campers as I saw photos of the fun they were having in the sun whilst at camp. I look forward to being part of Room 5's Deep Cove camp in just over a week's time!

This week I talked to the girls about why it is so important for them to learn how to solve their own problems. We discussed how it makes us stronger, helps us to gain confidence and teaches us valuable skills. We all need to work on this area with the girls, in triangulation. The girls themselves, yourselves as whanau and the staff. The world is becoming ever more complex and this skill is vital.

St John's is proud of the fact that we place all of our emphasis on rewarding the good, and showcasing our values. We do not focus on punitive outcomes; punishments. Of course there are always consequences for our actions, but placing the emphasis on the right thing, rather than the wrong, has a far more powerful effect and it contributes massively to the culture and special character of our school.

As a result of this, being spoken to by the teacher, or receiving a 'cross' often hits hard for St John's girls. That's because it rarely needs to happen. A cross is a warning as such, for incidents such as forgetting equipment or uniform, not completing what is required, or making a poor choice. If a girl receives three crosses during the course of a term, that equates to an order mark. This essentially removes a bonus point that another girl in the house has received for their efforts. Often houses receive no order marks in a term; a sign that the cross served as a timely reminder to sharpen up.

It is important that our girls learn from these mistakes. You can help them by discussing what happened, and how to ensure that it won't happen again. No parent likes to see their child upset, and it can often upset the parent themselves. It's human nature. We are protectors of those we love. Please take the time to consider that the discussion or consequence took place because it was necessary. Talk this through with your daughter. Have her reflect on what happened after she has had time to calm down and look back on the incident with a different mindset.

Perhaps she is still unclear, and feels that the situation is unjust? Encourage her to speak to her teacher to explain this.

Trust in your daughter's teacher(s). They seldom need to deliver a consequence and if they do, it was deserved.

Teaching children to solve their own problems is an important life skill that can help them in several ways:

- 1. **Develop independence**: When children are taught how to solve their own problems, they become more self-sufficient and less reliant on others. This helps to develop their independence and build their confidence.
- 2. **Enhance problem-solving skills**: Problem-solving is a valuable skill that can be applied to various aspects of life. By teaching children how to solve their own problems, they learn how to analyze a situation, identify potential solutions, and choose the best course of action.
- 3. **Encourage creativity**: When children are given the freedom to solve their own problems, they are encouraged to be creative and think outside the box. This helps to develop their creativity and imagination, which can be applied to various aspects of their lives.
- 4. **Promote responsibility**: When children are responsible for solving their own problems, they become more accountable for their actions. This helps to promote responsibility and accountability, which are important values to instill in children.
- 5. **Build resilience**: When children are faced with problems and are able to find solutions, they become more resilient. They learn how to bounce back from setbacks and become more confident in their abilities to handle challenges.

#### **Strike - School Closure**

We have had it confirmed that primary teachers will strike on Thursday 16 March alongside secondary colleagues and the primary principals. As a profession, teaching is becoming increasingly harder, and far less desirable. The intake of first year teachers into universities this year is frighteningly low, a startling realisation that things need to change in order to make the profession desirable and sustainable. The negotiations with the government are centered around workload, resource and ensuring that learning is the number one priority. It is not just a pay claim.

St John's will be closed on Thursday 16 March.

Last Friday our school had a mufti day! The girls looked awesome in their mufti and we all loved seeing the different outfits they chose.


Our school was raising money for the Red Cross charity who will be donating the money to help those who have lost homes and precious things due to cyclone Gabrielle.

### All about me – Rise Up Hot Air Balloons



#### Elsie Locke

They divorced two years later and she married Jack Locke in 1941. They had three children together but Elsie had originally had another child, Don. She was opposed to a lot of things including the Manapori power station.

FRIDA KAHLO'S LIFE SUMMARY (BORN JULY 6, 1907, COYOACÁN, MEX.—DIED JULY 13, 1954, COYOACÁN).. THE DAUGHTER OF A GERMAN JEWISH PHOTOGRAPHER, SHE HAD POLIO AS A CHILD WHICH CAUSED HER TO LIMP AND AT 18 SUFFERED A SERIOUS BUS ACCIDENT. SHE HAD 35 OPERATIONS; AND WHILE SHE WAS RECOVERING, SHE TAUGHT HERSELF TO PAINT. SHE IS KNOWN FOR HER INTENSE SELF-PORTRAITS, MANY SHOWING HER PERSONAL ORDEAL. LIKE MANY ARTISTS WORKING IN MEXICO, KAHLO WAS INSPIRED BY MEXICAN FOLK ART; THIS IS SHOWN IN HER USE OF BRILLIANT ELEMENTS AND BOLD USE OF COLOUR, AND IN HER PORTRAITS OF HERSELF WEARING TRADITIONAL MEXICAN, RATHER THAN EUROPEAN-STYLE, CLOTHES. HER MARRIAGE TO THE ARTIST DIEGO RIVERA (FROM 1929) WAS DIFFICULT CLOTHES. HER MARRIAGE TO THE ARTIST DIEGO RIVERA (FROM 1929) WAS DIFFICULT BUT ARTISTICALLY REWARDING. 

### **Cyber Safety**




### Camp
