We've had a real focus on gratefulness at school of late. I have spoken to the girls about looking at our situations from different viewpoints. This is valuable thinking for us all, adults included. Last week in assembly we talked about all of the jobs the girls had to do over the weekend. This included tidying bedrooms and picking up toys and clothes, loading the dishwasher, picking up doggy business, and bringing in firewood. We had a good laugh and relished in the moan.

I then told the girls how I felt sorry for them. It must have been rough for them. After all, this meant that they had a lot of toys and warm clothes that needed putting away. They'd eaten delicious meals if the dishwasher needed loading. Doggy business on the lawn means having a loving pet to play with and have as part of the family. Having firewood at home means warmth and comfort.

We re-visited this concept on Wednesday morning in assembly, and I shared a goal that I have for myself. It involves just 5 minutes each day. Ask your daughter if she can share my goal with you.

Hobart Conference

Mrs Kelly and I are incredibly grateful to have attended the Asia Pacific Summit on Girls' Education in Hobart. We were immersed in really intense days of listening, connecting and learning about the innovative practices in other girls' schools. Many of the keynote speakers told us about the challenges that our young women face in today's society, both in secondary schools and in the employment world. We processed each day's learnings in the evening and mused over some ideas we had heard. I will be sharing the work of Clinical Psychologist Judith Locke in some of the newsletters going forward. Her messages were thought-provoking and very relevant to the St John's community context.

On a side note, we both whole-heartedly recommend a visit to Hobart. What a hidden gem!

MISS O'CONNELL

We have had the privilege of having our student teacher, Miss O'Connell in the classroom for the past two weeks. We have been learning about time, friendships, teamwork, explanation writing and chalk pastel techniques.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION







TEACHER!



During physical education this week we looked at ways we can work effectively together in a team. We recorded our ideas and played a game that requires teamwork to be successful. We huddled together to evaluate how well we worked together and to add further strategies to our kete. We had so much fun working together and have learned how important this life skill is.

TIME

We have been learning about time and how to tell the time during maths. We have been working hard to identify the time and use language associated with an analogue clock to communicate what the time is. We have been looking at fractions within a clock and understand how many minutes are within each fraction.



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We have been learning how to explain how and why something happens. To begin our writing we did an experiment to test which materials float or sink, we formed hypotheses and recorded our observations. We then learned about density and we discovered that there are particles in materials, the proximity of these particles impacts whether they sink or float. We also learned about buoyancy and how this can affect something that would usually sink.

This term, Room 5 took a stroll around Queens Park and the school grounds taking photos of flowers, spider webs, leaves, plants and anything that we thought would make a fabulous photo. Everyone's photo is unique and very different to each other but when they were all placed together they complemented each other very well.

Speech Prep

Room 6 have been preparing for their speech exam which takes place on Monday next week. The girls have created a beautiful speech board or slide show and are expected to complete a 3 minute speech about these. They also have to read part of a novel and recite a poem. A telephone conversation is a new section of their speech exam this year and the girls are enjoying using our props to work on this area. Good luck girls. Novel Reading Circles

In reading, Room 6 is currently working on a group Novel study. The girls selected the novels they wanted to read, and groups were formed. This is a valuable and enjoyable reading programme as it provides opportunities for the girls to explore vocabulary and develop shared learning experiences with comprehension strategies. The girls have assigned roles within their groups. The roles include a summariser, clarifier, connector, vocabulary detective, literary observer, predictor, and a question master. We are reading 'The Boy in Striped Pyjamas', 'The Boy in the Dress', and 'See Ya Simon'. They girls are thoroughly enjoying reading their novels.



Sewing

The girls have been learning a lot about the sewing machine and are now able to independently thread the machines. They have completed several tasks involving sewing on paper and fabric squares to obtain their sewing machine drivers' licence. The girls are really enjoying learning new skills. They are now working to apply these skills and knowledge in creating their pyjama pants or shorts. It is lovely to see the girls' enthusiasm towards sewing and we look forward to all completing our pyjamas.


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Room 7 News

Maths & Patterns

We started making two visual growing patterns in Maths to explore how we look at them in different ways. Mrs Taylor asked us to try to find many different ways to see and describe patterns. We had to describe their growth in numbers (with an expression) and in words. We paired up in twos and made posters to display our work on the wall. We used colour coding to show our thinking. We discovered many different ways of seeing patterns.







Reciprocal Reading is when you read independently with a group and a teacher, but the teacher is not part of the group, they are just there to help us. We get to choose the topics that we want to read about and Mrs Bradshaw puts us in groups. This term the groups that we are in are: animals, science, history and people. When we finish a book we get three choices and we select as a group which book we want next. The books that we chose this term are Cook Strait Kate, Trip To The Circus, and Pet Power, which 2 groups are doing!

Inquiry

Our class has been learning about rockets. We have made plastic bottle rockets and baking soda rockets. Two weeks ago we tested different rocket cones launched by squeezing a plastic bottle inside. For the water bottle rockets we made a video of the rockets blasting off. Then we slowed the recording and measured the height. Mrs Taylor has shown us how to write up the instructions, how to plot the data on a graph and present our learning.

On Thursday we tested the baking soda and vinegar rockets outside. They didn't go that well. We are going to discuss our findings and change some variables in the experiment to see if we can create a rocket that can fly high! Some of us may choose to continue this experiment for our science investigation project. Over the next week, we will begin to investigate water bottle rockets.





Last week we finally had all our stencils printed on the 3D printer. We practised painting using the stencil on pieces of paper. When we decided which colours we liked best we had to paint on the bag. The very last step was "fixing" the paint so it didn't run by ironing the bags. We were very proud of ourselves and loved sharing them in assembly.



For music we were learning about the elements of music (the things in capital letters) through nursery rhymes.

To learn about them Mrs Taylor decided to let us make them on Scratch, a block coding programme.

We had to figure out the tune of the song by choosing the correct note in "play note"- this was the element MELODY. Then we had to make sure that the RHYTHM was right, by choosing the correct beat. To make it even harder we had to set up the FORM so that it went A B B A. We did this by creating new blocks. Next lesson we will add percussion to make the music THICKER. Then if we have time we will add HARMONY by adding chords.


