Spider Swing

We are always looking for opportunities to improve our practices in terms of safety and well-being. After some discussion I informed the girls in assembly that all swings across the school could only be used by one girl at a time, for safety reasons. In the days following, a group of Year 7 girls approached me and asked if they could discuss this decision with me. I met with the whole class and the girls talked to me about how they had researched the difference between having one or two people on the swing, and why having two people was in fact safer in terms of balance and stability. We chatted at length and the girls asked me to reconsider my decision, based on their findings.

I was so incredibly impressed at the thought, maturity and confidence these girls demonstrated in challenging a decision that they believed wasn't the right one. Last Friday they presented the new guidelines for use of the Spider Swing to the school in assembly, including the recommendation that having two girls on it is best. That is student agency at its best. We value our girls and what they think. Tino pai Leah, Meila, Ingrid and Greer for being positive change makers!




ROOM 2 NEWS






