It has been a calm and temperate week; the perfect way to end what has been a wonderful term. I have taken time this week to look at our everyday practices, the jobs people do, what we offer and our routines. Having taken the time to stop and observe, my lasting feeling was that of pride and admiration. We have so very much to be thankful for.

This week we saw the vast majority of families coming to their daughter's parent/teacher interviews. This is always a valuable opportunity to talk in depth about your daughter's achievements, growth and areas for development. Often when I speak with the girls about how their interview went, they tell me what they considered to be the 'bad part'; often something as simple as making sure she is prepared with what she needs for the day ahead. Yet when I ask the parents, they find all of the good in what was talked about.

We need to work collaboratively on the notion of perfectionism, and when I say work on it, I mean to remove it. It's not healthy. We cannot foster a growth mindset among our girls if they can't see feedback, or being reminded to sharpen up, as opportunities to improve or grow.

This week there have been conversations happening in classes about speech results. There have been disappointed girls as a result of achieving a 'highly commended' result, which is in fact the second highest available score. Mrs Kelly spoke to her speech class about this and asked the girls to think of their exams as the Speech Olympics. If at the Speech Olympics you won a silver medal, would you see that as failure? There was a shift in thinking as a result of this analogy.

We must all be mindful of expectations vs ability. We are all born differently and we all have different skills and levels of potential across a myriad of fields. Hopefully we all have things that we can admit we are good at, and we should be able to freely admit this to ourselves and others. Equally we need to be at peace with areas we find difficult. If I have given my $100 \%$ effort to what I have set out to achieve, then I must allow myself to be happy with this, regardless of the outcome.

It's in our nature as humans to feel disappointed if an outcome isn't what we had hoped for. Dr Judith Locke talks about how we must also allow ourselves to feel disappointment, or upset, as we then process the situation and the resulting feelings. As adults we cannot try to fix this feeling of upset for a child. We are tempted to offer something to cheer them up; perhaps a treat or a special something to look forward to. This can send the wrong message. It can suggest that being upset isn't OK, and that something needs to be offered to change the emotion. It can also teach a child to expect something to make them feel better when they are disappointed. We need to allow the emotions to process because as adults we know that we are able to process disappointment, and move on. Depending on the situation it may take moments, or days. As adults our experiences have taught us this and we need to allow our young people to discover the same.


Next time you realise your daughter has left her PE shoes in the middle of the bedroom floor, leave them there! By rescuing her and bringing them into school, she has learnt nothing. By allowing her to potentially get a cross, a learning opportunity may occur.

## O <br> The Code

Our spelling programme is based on 'The Code' by Liz Cane and it is a structured way to learn spelling sounds and patterns. The girls are in groups and have a teacher session, learning about their set of words. They then have a practice session where they have a follow up task to complete based on their learning. Finally and possibly their favourite they have a multisensory session where they use Lego, chalk, playdoh, stamps, felts, whiteboards and letters to practise their words. We also have a load of spelling games to play when they are finished which they love Spelligator, Hangman, Shoot, Quiddler, Dominoes, Word Families


## Inquiry

As part of our 'Rise Up' inquiry we have been learning about birds. Our class decided to research native birds and find a way to attract more to our school. We came up with a great idea that we could plant a garden with some of the delicious native trees and bushes they love to nibble. Jonny from 'The Plant Store' visited and shared his expertise on what would be suitable and brought with him some possible ideas. He was very clever and drew us up a plan and a costing. We then wrote a letter to Mr Hughes asking him to support our idea and possibly fund our native garden to attract native birds to our school. We are currently waiting for his response and our fingers and toes are crossed.

As we were researching we also found out that native birds find it difficult to find enough food during our Winter months so we looked into bird feeders. We're looking at one that has a bottle we can put sugar syrup in, which they love and a ledge that we can put some fruit on for them.

Ashlyn's family have also leant us a beautiful bird house that they built for us to hang outside our room to see if any other little birds would come to visit.




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
