Attendance

As you will be aware from the recent media coverage, school attendance rates across New Zealand are in a dire situation. Covid saw us becoming more flexible with how we learnt, however for primary aged children onsite learning is by far the best way. We, like every other school in New Zealand, are having our attendance monitored. The Ministry of Education are keeping a very close eye on it. They receive our attendance information daily, via KAMAR, our student management system. If your daughter has a day off a fortnight, that is 10 percent of the time that she is not here. The learning she misses out on is essentially more than that, as tasks and concepts roll on over many days. Continuity is vital.

Absences

A timely reminder to always inform the office if your daughter is going to be late, or absent. We do need a reason please as this information is reported to the Ministry. Please telephone, email or Skool Loop prior to 8.30am.

We need to know where your daughter is, so we can ensure nothing happened to her on the way to school.

Last week it was ANZAC day! The reason why we have ANZAC day is so we can remember all the people that fought in the war for us. World War 1 was 105 years ago it started in 1914 till 1918 meaning it lasted for four years. World War 2 lasted for 6 years, from 1939 till 1945, it lasted 2 years longer. ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. The soldiers in those forces became known as ANZACs. Anzac Day is a commemoration of the anniversary of the landing of Australian and New Zealand troops at Gallipoli, Turkey on 25 April in 1915. They came there as part of the Allies invasion. Australians also commemorate Anzac Day on 25 April every year. Anzac Day always draws large crowds of people to the dawn services that they hold in the early mornings. Marches are also held around the country as respect. Every Anzac Day everyone wears poppies on their shirts. This is because poppies were the only flower that grew on the battlefields. It helps to remember those who fought for us.

To celebrate ANZAC Day we read stories and created this beautiful wreath together. Each girl contributed their own Poppy.






Digital Technology
